**DR. ROUSH'S RACY LETTERS**  
**He Writes to the Whig About His Tour in Norway and Elsewhere.**  
**Plenty of Norwegians Who Have Lived in Norway—They Often Go Back Because of Domestic Demand—Here is a Really Exciting Motor Ride.**

Special to the Whig.  
There is a section of Norway called the "Jotunheim." It is a vast area located in the middle of the country and occupying the most elevated districts of the land. "Jotunheim" means "Giant's home," and it is not inaptly named for it is a stretch of land as wild and ferocious as one would care to visit. Glaciers rivalling in size and splendor those of Switzerland are here encountered together with vast fields of perpetual snow. Numerous lakes, their limpid waters confined by rock-rimmed basins five thousand feet above the sea, sparkle like diamonds in the dazzling sun and mirror back from the heights above many a frowning cliff and snow-capped peak that linger like some vain knight above these glassy surfaces. Amid these desolate wastes an occasional herd of reindeer may be seen high up the side of some precipitous cliff feeding upon the moss and lichens that cover the rocks. In the sheltered valleys a "shack" is now and then observed which serves as a shelter and store house for the herder who drives his cows from the farms below to feed for a few months on the succulent summer grass. In the winter season the Jotunheim is practically uninhabited, and the howl of the wintery storms and icy blasts reverberates unheard by human ears among the crags and cliffs of this dreary desolation.

One of Norway's fixtures.  
I had a week at my disposal while in Christiania and I went to Bennett's to discuss the matter with him. He advised me to go to the Jotunheim. I say "he" because the original Bennett belonged to the masculine gender. "Bennett" to-day means a big office front on the principal street of Christiania with scores of clerks and at times busily engaged at their several tasks behind the heavy plate glass. Years ago Bennett was an Englishman who came to Norway, perhaps it was for his health—I don't know. At any rate he went to Norway and liked it so well he neglected to return. His friends heard about his newly-discovered play ground and wrote him for a tip. Then they came on his advice. Next year ago Bennett, the tourist's friend and counsellor, started on that long journey whence no traveler ever returns, but the institution he founded remains up to-day is one of the noteworthy fixtures of Norway. So I went to Bennett's and Bennett met me in his case, in the guise of a charming lady who spoke flawless English and who after learning of the time at my disposal said: "Go to Jotunheim."

Then she disappeared for a few moments and when she returned she gave me a sample letter, looked attractive, and I returned to the office four hours later and obtained in a neat little book everything useful in the way of various coupons to pay all expenses while en route through this rugged district.  
**The Journey to Jotunheim.**  
The next morning we started. First we travelled by train for four or five hours. Then the sturdy engine, after pulling itself up grade into a state of utter exhaustion stopped with its nose almost literally against the rocky side of a high mountain range. It could go no further, so we alighted. A well-dressed gentleman spoke to me and I wondered how he knew my name. Then he motioned to a powerful touring car that stood nearby. Bennett's master hand had omitted no detail. So after six of us had taken seats the chauffeur cranked the machine and we started off. Up the side of the mountain a road was hewn from the virgin rock along which the powerful auto glided with speedy ease. As we ascended the view became more and more extensive and beautiful. The air also grew more and more snappy and the hospitable fur robes were very acceptable. Higher and higher we climbed, now skirting a cliff with a scarp that dropped a sheer thousand feet to the bottom of the valley below, again speeding along a level stretch of road through a clump of pines surrounding a miniature plateau. In an hour we had gained the top of the first mountain chain and in every direction as far as the eye could reach a billowy sea of peaks and ridges with numerous lakes resembling bits of looking glass in the valleys below presented as fascinating a nature picture as can be found elsewhere in the whole world.  
In a few moments we halted at our first rest house. These stations scattered at convenient distances in the Jotunheim district are the result of the travellers' demands and as a rule are the ventures of private enterprise. Here we alighted, had a cup of tea and after walking around a bit and stretching our limbs, re-entered the auto and proceeded on our journey.  
Another hour brought us above the tree line and the scenery now began to assume that austere aspect that comes with the disappearance of the softening effects of the forest. We now motored across a wind-swept plateau barren of vegetation and dotted with lake-like pockets of water in which the ice of last winter still remained,

but partially melted. Forbidding peaks, outlined against the steely blue sky flitted themselves aloft in silent grandeur and added to the awe and impressiveness of the "Giant's home." All the while we were steadily ascending and all the while was the air growing steadily sharper. The chauffeur's ears resembled pink sea shells and his nose was the hue of sunset. So he sped along at a rate begotten of a cold nose and tingling ears, but which seemed to us a trifle too speedy for safety.  
At the Jotunheim Summit.  
In due time, however, we reached the altitude of the vast tableland that forms the summit of the Jotunheim and there under the shelter of a forbidding granite peak stood our substantial log hotel at which we meant to remain over night. We were a trifle unimpressed when we alighted, but a roaring fire in a big corner fireplace, a cup of hot coffee, a cozy room and the odor of a savory supper in process of preparation in the adjoining kitchen soon gave rise to pleasant anticipations which the howling wind outside only emphasized and quickened. So when supper was announced we lost no time in gaining the dining-room. Here the rustic logs, the deer antlers and other trophies of the chase, gave the impression of a hunting lodge which in the deep shadows of the tallow candle-light seemed peopled with many a pleasant association, the supper was delicious. Our waiter spoke good American for she had lived for ten years in the states. And this experience was repeated again and again throughout Norway. "Oh yes, I lived in America," we heard on every side. "Why did you return?" I often asked. And it was usually the story of an old father or mother, a sick sister or brother or some other domestic demand that brought them temporarily back to the home land. Norwegian America means almost as many native-born Norwegians as does Norway, and especially in Michigan and Minnesota will one find whole communities consisting entirely of Norwegians who still for the most part retain the native tongue and follow many of the home land customs. And so it sometimes transpires to the American traveling in Norway as in one (Continued on Page 7.)

**TO PARTIALLY EXEMPT THE PROPERTY OF THE CANADIAN LOCOMOTIVE COMPANY, LIMITED**

**Voting on By-law, January 1st, 1912.**  
**A By-law to partially exempt the property of CANADIAN LOCOMOTIVE COMPANY LIMITED, in the City of Kingston from the first day of January 1912.**

**WHEREA** THE CANADIAN LOCOMOTIVE COMPANY, LIMITED, have applied to this Council for a partial exemption of their property in said City and have represented that they are about to make certain additions and extensions to their Works and Property in this City to the amount of at least \$300,000 as hereinafter mentioned:  
**AND WHEREA** it is expedient to grant the exemption prayed for but subject to the following conditions as hereinafter set forth:  
**BE IT, THEREFORE, ENACTED** by the Council of the Corporation of the City of Kingston as follows:  
**1.** That the assessment of the real and personal property of Canadian Locomotive Company, Limited, owned and used by them for the purposes of their business, and situated within the Municipality of the City of Kingston shall be fixed for the purpose of Municipal Taxation, except for school purposes, at the sum of \$300,000, including any business assessment for the period of ten years from the 1st day of January, 1912, and subject to the approval and confirmation of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, for a further period of five years from the expiration of that term provided the said Company expend in the improvement and extension of their property, works and plant, in said City, the sum of at least \$100,000 within the first year and such further sum as in one year and such further sum as in the amount expended in the first year will make the sum of at least \$300,000 expended within two years from the first day of January, A.D. 1912, such expenditure to be established to the satisfaction of the City Treasurer, and upon default in making such expenditure the said exemption shall cease for the year in which the default occurs and should the \$300,000 not be expended within the said two years the exemption to wholly cease.  
**2.** The votes of the duly qualified electors of the said Municipality shall be taken upon this By-law at the same hour on the same day, and at the same place, and by the same Deputy Returning Officers as for the annual election for the Municipal Council for the year 1912.  
**3.** On the 21st day of December, 1911, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon, the Mayor of the said City shall attend at the office of the City Clerk, in said City, for the purpose of appointing and shall appoint in writing signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes given for and against this By-law, and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this By-law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-law, and the place, day and hour are hereby fixed for said purpose.  
**4.** On the second day of January, 1912, at the hour of twelve o'clock noon, at his office in the City of Kingston, the Clerk of the said Municipality shall attend and sum up the number of votes given for and against the By-law.  
**5.** On the 21st day of December, 1911, at the hour of eleven o'clock in the forenoon, the Mayor of the said City shall attend at the office of the City Clerk, in said City, for the purpose of appointing and shall appoint in writing signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes of the Clerk of this Corporation, and one person to attend each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of the answering of the question in the affirmative, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of the answering of the said question in the negative respectively.  
**6.** The second day of January, 1912, at his office in the City Buildings, at twelve o'clock noon, is hereby appointed for the summing up by the Clerk of this Corporation of the number of votes given in the affirmative and in the negative respectively.
