

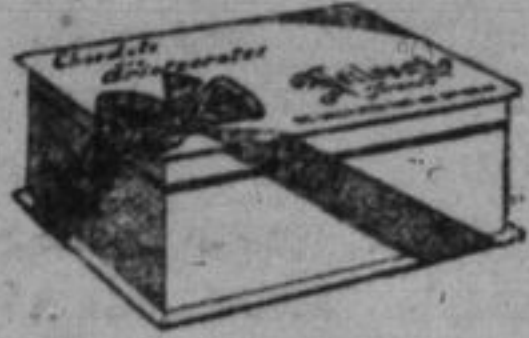

instance I recall where the waitress at the hotel proved to be the American guest's own chambermaid of but two years previous.

An Exciting Experience.

The next morning the wind was still blowing a gale. We hoped to make the trip over Lake Bygdn, but the storm delayed the start. About ten o'clock, however, the motor boat hove in sight and we embarked. It was a four-hour trip for this narrow strip of glacier-lake extends to a length of many miles, to navigate which with the high winds and rough waters, was a slow but exciting experience. Our little craft was constantly shipping water and the miniature cabin afforded but scanty protection. But with rain coats and oil skin steamer rugs we managed to escape the wet and in due course arrived at our destination at the farther end of the lake. Here stood another mountain hostelry and here again we were met by "mein host" and comforted with a warm dinner and all that goes with it calculated to make one forget a cold rough voyage over a choppy lake.

The next stages of our journey was overland to Lake Tyn. Here we first made the acquaintance of that famed, two-wheeled vehicle that has made Norway famous. I refer to that ubiquitous and characteristic cart known in Norwegian parlance as the "Stokkjerre." I practiced one hour under a competent native tutor trying to properly pronounce the name of this vehicle and then I gave it up and followed the example of most foreigners and called it "stoll car." Because of the inability of the foreign tongue to loop the loop around that "kjærre," it is now customary for all visitors to Norway to simply say "stoll car" and let it go at that. Now a stoll car is neither a brougham or a sulky. It seems to me to be a combination of a hay rake and a baby carriage—combining the harshness of the one with the infantile ease of the other. In a country where the face of nature is a face of seams and wrinkles, deeply wrought, and rugged anything that rolls on wheels should be simple. The stoll car answers the conditions of the steep grades and narrow roads admirably. It will accommodate the driver and two passengers and is drawn by one horse, or more correctly speaking, one pony, for horses are few and ponies are common. They are seldom seen in Norway. "Icelandic ponies" they call them and for toughness both moral and mental they have but few equals.

Equine Imps of Darkness.

I have driven these ponies over many an exciting mile in Norway and they seem to know a "Landerfoot" at a glance. I have seen two ponies about to start on an overland trip with two tenderfoot drivers look at each other in a knowing way and exchange glances that plainly meant "we'll have some fun to-day." On one occasion I happened to be the driver of one of these equine imps of darkness and that son of Satan was never happier than when he had just barely missed dumping me out of the cart and over a precipice that dropped away to the valley below without a break in the frightful descent. Of course they never quite topple over, but their chief delight seems to be in seeing the white out of drivers of a timid turn of mind.

The native driver, if one prefers not to drive one's self, is usually a boy who sits on a projecting seat at the rear of the cart and is usually as full of reckless mischief as the pony he drives. There seems to be a set of

secret signals between the pony and himself which when exchanged means an awful shock is coming to the passenger's nerves.

Sometimes it is a pretended runaway when the pony and cart will suddenly plunge headlong down a steep grade that ends at the bottom in a sharp turn to the right or left which at the furious gait would mean a mangled mass of cart and humanity at the bottom of the gorge beyond. But just as the panic-stricken passenger is breathing a parting prayer the pony slows down, the boy's excited concern abates and one can feel that they are both quietly enjoying the joke at his expense.

But after a few experiences of this kind one gains confidence and thoroughly enjoys the stoll car excursions overland from station to station, for every road in Norway is divided into sections and the residents of each section are compelled by law to furnish pony and cart for travellers passing their way. A low fixed charge is made and one may travel at will throughout the length and breadth of the land by this not unpleasant means of local transportation.

An Exciting Motor Ride.

Lake Lynn is only a short drive by stoll car from the head of Lake Bygdn, and the road is safe and comparatively level. A motor boat brought us to Framnes hotel, the wildest and windiest spot in all the Jotunheim region. We remained over night here and then we started about noon the next day by motor car on a fifty-mile ride that I shall never forget. We had reached our highest point in the Jotunheim and our course now lay to Fagernes, fifty miles away and several thousand feet below. Unless the demon chauffeur that drove us to Fagernes is interrupted in his mad flights by some act of Providence some valley rivulet will run red with human gore before another summer is over and a heap of twisted iron will mark the spot where the auto struck.

Did you ever see a Norwegian road? While they are as well made as a drive still they are always very narrow and as crooked as a corkscrew. One side is usually hemmed in by a perpendicular side of the mountain, while the other generally falls away to a lake, valley or borderless ravine to reach which would mean a fearful plunge of oftentimes a thousand or more feet. Though offering no protection whatever to a motor run amuck still the dangerous side of the road is always edged by a row of upright stones placed according to the danger from five to fifteen feet apart. It was over such a road that we started on this exciting ride. At first I shut my eyes and held on for dear life as we swept around the brinks of these awful chasms. On a road too narrow for two vehicles to pass and so tortuous that often not more than a hundred feet was visible at a time, this demon driver sped on at a terrific gait while the swerving machine threw up a stream of gravel in our wake. The snapshots of scenery we occasionally caught glimpses of, were sublime, but on the auto flew and we had no time to look. We braced ourselves and clutched at the supports with all our strength and even then we barely escaped being hurled from the machine. Nor a word was spoken but breathless from excitement each of us held on in grim silence. Finally we slowed up at a wayside inn and then there was an indignation meeting at which resolutions verbal were adopted that carried no uncertain meaning. When the chauffeur resumed his seat, the findings of the court were duly transmitted to him, and the remainder of the trip was a joy and a delight.

The close of our strenuous tour found us again in the valleys of peace. If one would realize all the comforts of home let him enter the portals of Fagernes hotel after a trip to the Jotunheim. Mein host with his charming daughter gave us a true Norwegian welcome for genial hospitality cannot be surpassed. The Fagernes hotel is known throughout the length and breadth of Norway, and here as sitting dining to a vigorous trip one may bask ad libitum in the delights of the hostelry and the charms of the scenery and never grow weary of either.
