**ASK FOR EXTENSION**

**OF INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY, MONTREAL TO TORONTO.**

Board of Trade Will Ask That Line be Extended Along St. Lawrence River and Lake Ontario—Want Fast Westbound Train to Stop at Gananoque.

At a meeting of the board of trade, held on Wednesday night, E. T. Stecyk asked that the board communicate with the Grand Trunk railway, in reference to continuing the stopping of the fast train, going west, at Gananoque Junction. He pointed out that quite a large number came to the city, by this train, to do business, going home in the evening, and that if the train did not stop at Gananoque, Kingston merchants would lose business.

Dr. Ryan, the president stated that the matter would be taken up in conjunction with the board of trade at Gananoque.

Dr. Ryan expressed the opinion that the dominion government should extend the Intercolonial railway, from Montreal to Toronto, running along the St. Lawrence river and Lake Ontario.

There was some discussion on the matter, and afterwards it was decided, on motion of Robert Meek and W. H. Givens, to have the board submit a resolution at the annual meeting of the Ontario Associated Board of Trade, calling upon the government to make this extension.

Regarding the stage route to Westport, it was reported that W. F. Nickle, M.P., had telephoned to the deputy postmaster-general in reference to the continuation of the mail route to Westport, and had been assured that the department upon receiving representations from the board, would consider the matter.

Hallett & Davis company, of Boston, wrote the board, stating that should they decide upon a Canadian plant, they would take pleasure in considering Kingston.

In the absence of the chairman of the hotel committee, the president made a few remarks in reference to reports circulated about the city to the effect that the hotel proposition was being dropped. He said the matter was progressing favorably, that a charter had been obtained for the company, and that the hotel would be built.

Dr. Black made the suggestion that the city be requested to improve the appearance of the premises at the foot of West street.

It was reported here that Mr. Polson, chairman of the entertainment committee, was arranging for a banquet to be held in connection with the opening of the new rooms of the board. Certain cabinet members from Ottawa would be invited to attend.

Dr. Ryan drew the attention of the members to the fact that at the municipal elections, three by-laws of great importance to the industrial life of the city, would be presented, and stated that they should be energetically supported by the members.

It was resolved to organize in support of the Hydro-Electric, Canadian Locomotive company, and Commercial Box and Envelope company, and that the organization used, in connection with the hotel by-law, be again used in support of these by-laws, the chairman who acted in each ward, in the vote on the hotel by-law, to take charge of the respective wards in the vote on these by-laws.

James Campbell, who was sentenced to two years in penitentiary, for stabbing, was taken to the prison on Thursday morning. He will be back to his old place again for seven years. He still has five years of his former sentence to serve.

Although Queen's made the highest score, the Dominion Rifle Association awarded the inter-university prize for shooting to the Toronto University. It is said Queen's did not use the rifle proposed by the association, though they did use the militia regulation rifle.
