ONLY ONE OBJECTED

TO APPOINTMENT OF CITY ENGINEER McCLELLAND.

Ald. Givens Voted Nay, While the Other Seventeen Supported the Recommendation of the Board of Works.

Only one voice was raised in the city council meeting against the appointment of Richard J. McClelland as city engineer. Ald. Givens stated his objections in detail, and recorded his vote against the recommendation of the board of works.

Ald. Givens, in stating his objections to the appointment, declared, first, that Mr. McClelland was not an engineer. If the board had recommended that he be appointed supervisor of works, he would support the recommendation, but he could not support his appointment as city engineer, for he did not have the necessary theoretical qualifications. If Mr. McClelland's qualifications were sufficient, then the science work at Queen's University is "a fake," Ald. Givens declared. To turn down a Queen's graduate was a slap in the face at the university. Mr. McClelland's evidence in court would not be taken in a court of law as an engineer. Kingston, Ald. Givens held, should get as good an engineer as it could get. The city needed a good man, upon whom it could rely. Ald. Givens said he made these remarks with regret, for Mr. McClelland was a fine young man and citizen.

Ald. Bailey asked that Prof. A. K. Kirkpatrick's recommendation of Mr. McClelland be read. Prof. Kirkpatrick in his letter, stated that he hoped Mr. McClelland would succeed in "landing the job." He said that the only work he saw ahead that Mr. McClelland would not be able to design, would be a sewage disposal plant, which must inevitably come, but this was a question for expert advice no matter who was city engineer, and Mr. McClelland would be able to carry out the plans and instructions given by such expert.

Ald. Carson said that Ald. Givens had helped several years ago, to make Mr. McClelland an assistant engineer. Why then not make him engineer after his lengthy experience? Ald. Carson held that Mr. McClelland was quite fit to do the engineering work for this city. Kingston, Ald. Carson said, had paid pretty dearly for technical engineering. What it wanted was a practical engineer, not a theorist. Mr. McClelland had been carrying on the work since the ex-city engineer resigned, and the work was being well done. When Kingston had William Irving as engineer, years ago, it had a practical man, and not a theorist, and good work was done. Ald. Carson said that Mr. McClelland deserved the position, and was fully capable of filling it. Ald. Litton said he worked under the direction of the theoretical engineer, and found them lacking in practical experience. He preferred a practical man every time. Kingston could not afford to pay a high-priced engineer. Several engineers, Ald. Litton said, had worked for Kingston merely to get practical experience; then they went away. This ended the discussion, and the recommendation to appoint Mr. McClelland was adopted. Ald. Givens alone voting nay.



A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$2.50 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and have a house worth \$200.00.
