## HOLD FINAL MEETING

### CITY COUNCIL PUT THROUGH APPOINTMENTS

Of R. J. McClelland as City Engineer and C. C. Folger as Utilities Manager—To Buy Susann and Cohen Property.

The city council concluded civic business for the year at its meeting last evening. It filled the city engineering vacancy by the appointment of Richard J. McClelland, appointed Collamer C. Folger as manager of the water as well as the light department, authorized the purchase of additional land for light plant extensions, and arranged for the municipal elections on January 1st. In attendance were: Mayor Graham and Alds. Armstrong, Bailey, Carson, Couper, Clagston, Elliott, Givens, Hanley, Harrison, Harty, Hoag, Kent, Litton, McAnn, McCarthy, Ross, Shaw and Toye.

These communications were read: Joseph J. Brophy, asking for refund of \$3.50 on account of fine for not having local improvements installed. Secretary board of health, presenting resolution from board of health re sewer in Sydenham street. The Hastings Quarries, Ltd., asking privilege of tendering for stone. F. Crozier, secretary Kingston Poultry, Pigeon and Pet Stock Association, re use of Ontario hall for annual show in January. City auditor re pay rolls of the Wormwith Piano company. Medical health officer, submitting annual report. George Tuttle and others, re street watering on Raglan road.

**Adoption of Reports.**  
These recommendations of the finance committee were adopted: That the refund of taxes to Sarah L. Young as recommended by the court of revision be not paid. That \$10 be placed to the credit of fire and light committee, and that \$140 be placed to the credit of city property committee.

That the city treasurer be authorized to pay to the treasurer of the Kingston Health Association the sum of \$2,000, this amount being placed in the budget for the Oliver Mowat Memorial hospital. Reports of committees already published were adopted.

On recommendation of the water works committee, a bonus of \$50 was granted Matthew Murphy for the excellent work he did in locating the leak in the intake pipe. The light, heat and power committee recommended that the city purchase the property owned by Susann & Cohen, at the corner of Ontario and Barrack streets, for \$7,500 for plant extensions. Ald. Elliott explained that this property was very much needed by the plant for railway purposes. So that oil could be unadvisedly cheaper. Its purchase would save the city \$105 a year, after paying interest on the purchase price. The figure of \$7,500 had been fixed after a great deal of negotiations. The council adopted the recommendation. The council adopted the report of the special committee appointed to consider department amalgamation. It appointed Collamer C. Folger as manager of the light and water plants at \$2,000 a year, and decided to call the new committee to oversee the business of the plants, the civic utilities committee.

**General Business.**  
By-laws were passed confirming the appointments of R. J. McClelland and C. C. Folger; establishing a civic utilities committee, and fixing the places for municipal nomination and polling.

On motion of Alds. Armstrong and Carson, the salary of City Engineer McClelland was made to date from October 1st, 1911. James B. Gordon was appointed chief clerk in the city engineer's office on motion of Alds. Harrison and Bailey, the salary to be \$700 a year, beginning January 1st, 1912.

The council, on motion of Alds. Harrison and McCann, instructed the industries' committee to insert in the two daily papers during the last week of December, the forms of the ballots to be submitted to the electors on January 1st, so as to accustom the voters to what they have to mark in the polls. The council adjourned just before ten o'clock, after accepting Mayor Graham's invitation to be his guests at the Ironopolis hotel immediately afterwards.

## PAID HEAVY FINE

### For Creating Disturbance on Railway Train.

Creating a disturbance on a railway train, steamboat, or any kind of conveyance, constitutes a very serious offence, in the eyes of the law. Daniel Fitzgerald, a young man, found this to his sorrow, in police court, Tuesday morning, when Magistrate Farrell found him guilty of using bad language and creating a disturbance on a train on the Grand Trunk railway, and imposed a fine of \$10 and costs, or twenty days. The accused was in police court, Monday morning, and was remanded. The charge against Fitzgerald was that of having used bad language towards Conductor David White, on the night of his coming from Belleville. Fitzgerald pleaded guilty, stating that he was under the influence of liquor, at the time, and that he did not know what he was doing. Fitzgerald was on his way from Belleville to Coteau Junction. The magistrate pointed out to the accused the seriousness of the charge, and stated that the public had to be protected.

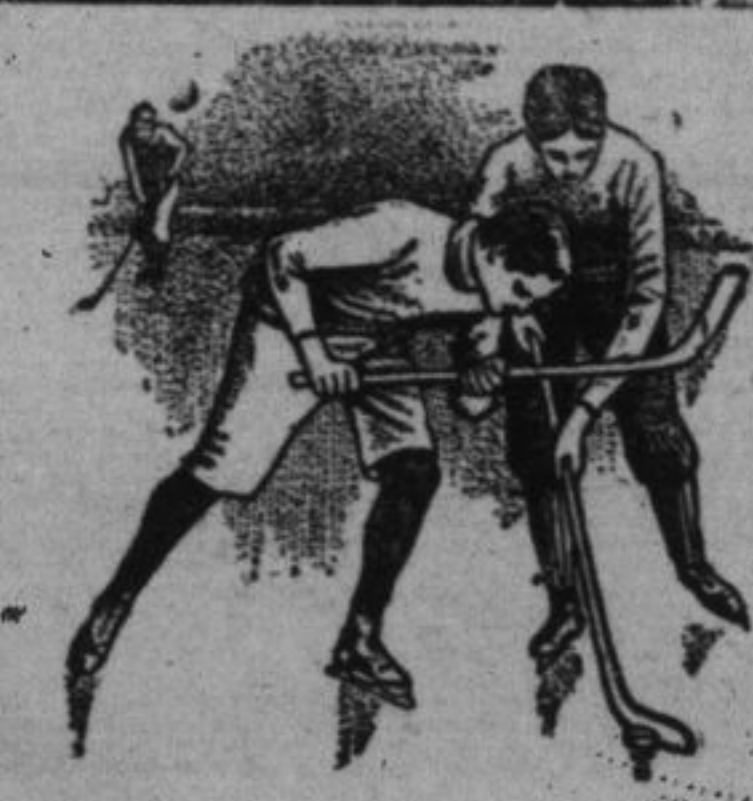
## Students Going Home.
