MEAN SPIRIT IS SHOWN

BY BORDEN GOVERNMENT AT CHRISTMAS SEASON.

Dismissals Going on—Inoffensive Employees Sent Adrift—Public Works Department the Worst Offender.
Ottawa, Dec. 19.—While Hon. F. D. Monk was unctuously proclaiming in Montreal last week that the patronage list had been abolished in his department, patronage evils in his grosser form were being sanctioned by him in the shape of summary dismissals of unoffending liberal employees of his department to make way for conservative workers in the last election campaign. The spoils system in its crudest and most unjustifiable form is being openly enforced in Ottawa, and the greatest number of dismissals have been in Mr. Monk's own department.
The Christmas spirit of the Borden ministry is certainly not what might be expected from the fair-spoken words of the premier and his colleagues when in opposition. Instead of justice and fair play there has been rank and inexcusably harsh treatment of scores of employees, who have been filling positions in the service at Ottawa for years, and whose only offence is that they are liberals.
The summary dismissal of some one hundred and fifty employees on Monday evening, among many of the best citizens of Ottawa, a decided reaction against the government.
As far as can be learned there was practically no investigation as to the merits of the dismissals. Men with practically no funds to fall back on, were hastily told just a week before Christmas, and at a season of the year when other work is hard to find, that their services were no longer needed. Conservative ward chairman and party workers were promptly dismissed in their places. One of the elevator men in the commons building, for instance, who was dismissed, has given every satisfaction in his faithful attention to his work. He has a mother and two sisters to support but owing to difficulty with his eyes cannot now resume his trade of stonemason. He had not taken any part in politics since employed at the buildings. A local conservative ward chairman takes his place.
The elevator man in the east block, who served the privy council office for many years past, and against whom there was no complaint, was summarily dismissed. He works in Premier Borden's room with tears in his eyes to beg for reconsideration of his case. He was told the matter belonged to Hon. Mr. Monk's department and that he had two instances.
