Washington, Dec. 20.—The conversion of desert basins into fields of supply for the fertilizer industry is part of the scheme of the agricultural advancement favoured by Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, and heartily endorsed by President Taft in a message to congress. The message was a cordial letter of transmittal of a preliminary report on the fertilizer resources of the United States. The report showed that the use of fertilizers involves an annual expenditure of about \$120,000,000, which is likely to be greatly increased as more modern agricultural methods are adopted.
