Part of the fund will be used to provide for free medical attendance for those who are insured; part will into the maintenance of sanitariums; part will be held for sickness and outof-work compensation.

The new law will go into effect on July 15th, 1912, unless some unforeseen difficulties arise, In that event the king will be asked to name a subsequent date, not later than October 1st, for the unemployment insurance nor later than April 1st, 1913, for the sickness insurance.

Somewhat to the surprise of every body, the weakest point in the bill has proved to be the clause providing for the insurance of domestic vants. Under the bill the mistress will have to deduct from the servant's wages the small contribution which the government demands-thirteen shillings a year-for insurance.
