

TO AID MILLIONS

EMPLOYERS AND EMPLOYEES WILL CONTRIBUTE TO FUND.

Big Social Reform Awaits Only Approval of King George and Will Go Into Effect July 15, 1915.

London, Dec. 20.—The national insurance bill, providing for compulsory insurance against sickness and unemployment of the working class, probably the biggest thing in the world in a legislative way, now pending, has been passed by parliament.

The bill is now practically completely ready for passing through the formalities of receiving the king's assent.

Except for the bill passed last year curbing the House of Lords, this is the most far-reaching piece of legislation which parliament has enacted in many years.

It is a very long bill, full of minute provisions which drew a flood of more than 400 amendments when the bill was on its way through the house of commons.

The bill is based upon the principle that the state is so deeply affected by sickness and unemployment of its inhabitants that it has a right to insist on such measures as will tend to abolish those evils and their economic effects.

This is to be done by an insurance fund to which both the employers and the employees are obliged to contribute.

Part of the fund will be used to provide for medical attendance for those who are insured; part will go into the maintenance of sanitariums; part will be held for sickness and out-of-work compensation.

The new law will go into effect on July 15th, 1912, unless some unforeseen difficulties arise.

Somewhat to the surprise of everybody, the weakest point in the bill has proved to be the clause providing for the insurance of domestic servants.
