**RAN OFF WITH A RING**  
AND CAUSED TROUBLE ON PRINCESS STREET.

Woman Entered Home of Constable Timmerman and Purloined an Umbrella, But Was Caught—Cases Before the Magistrate on Friday Morning.

The loss of a ring, caused no end of excitement, on Princess street, for a time, on Thursday night. It is alleged that while a number of Swedes, who have been employed on railway construction work, were together, one of the number shook hands with another, and in doing so, pulled a gold ring off his finger and then made off. The ring has not yet been found, but it is claimed that it was pawned at a local second-hand store, so it may be unearthed yet.

Several police constables were on the scene, soon after the row, but the man alleged to have taken the ring could not be located.

John Ryan was placed under arrest, and it is alleged that he was the companion of the man that took the ring, and that he could tell just where the ring had been taken. Constables Filson and Armstrong said Ryan had been drinking, and on this charge he was fined \$3 and costs or thirty days. The constables, on making an investigation, found that the Swedes had been fighting among themselves on Princess street.

Joseph Dennis and Dolphin Corbel were on the carpet for being drunk, and a fine of \$1 and costs was imposed upon each. They have been working for the Canadian Northern railway, and stated that they came in to make some purchases at the stores. However, their chief business appeared to be visiting hotels.

Although she protested against the charge that she was drunk, a middle-aged woman arrested, was found guilty of being drunk and disorderly, and fined \$5 and costs or twenty days. Constable Timmerman made the arrest, and in his evidence he told about the woman going into the hallway at his own home, and stealing an umbrella. This occurred early in the evening, when there was a light fall of rain. The woman was drunk and did not know what she was doing.

**WILL PRESS INTO SERVICE**  
Vessel Being Built for Government in Kingston.

A special despatch to the Whig from Ottawa says: "A vessel being built at Kingston, for the government, will soon be pressed into service, said Alexander Johnston, deputy minister of marine and fisheries, when asked about the work of the ice-breakers on the St. Lawrence river, especially in connection with the annual ice jam at Cap Rouge."

Mr. Johnston stated that the Montcalm and the Lady Grey would be reinforced by a third vessel, now in course of construction at Kingston. The service of the ice-breakers, he said, had not been of material benefit, in bringing about earlier opening of navigation in the spring, but their presence on the river caused navigation to be prolonged in the fall, and this year vessels had sailed from Montreal as late as December 3rd.

The vessels had also served a useful purpose in preventing the annual floods which, in previous years, devastated the country on both sides of the St. Lawrence when the ice jam broke up in the spring."

**Drops as Alderman.**

In view of the fact that Aid. Hoag has been elected mayor for 1912, he will have to resign as alderman for Frontenac ward. His resignation cannot be dealt with until the council of 1912 meets in January. There will thus be a vacancy in Frontenac ward, and another aldermanic election will have to be held.

**Pulled Off His Horse.**

When the horse artillery was out exercising the horses Friday morning one of the horses became unmanageable in front of the Whig, and pulled the man who was leading him off his horse, threw him heavily to the ground and dashed on.
