Chicago, Dec. 22 .- Old age and relentless saving brought George Bonnett, the veteran newsboy, wealth for lack of which the one romance of his life expired thirty-five years ago. His death in a cheap lodging returns his savings of \$20,000 to the town he abjured when his love failed and to re latives with whom he had long ago ceased to correspond.

C. M. Lovett, of Wooster, Ohio, a half-brother, is the only surviving member of Bonnett's family so far discovered. His appearance on the scene yesterday, will probably deprive the Newsboys' Home of the Federal Mining Reduction company, his intention of leaving his fortune to the home. No will has been found,

Bonnett was about seventy years old. For a quarter of a century he had been the owner of an office building paper route which brought him a fine income. He lived in a sparsely furnished room in the Harrison hotel, paying a rent of \$3 a month, and eating at cherry lunch counters.
