SUPPORT THE POWER BY-LAW

Light Department Endorses the Hydro-Electric Commission Proposition.

Kingston, Dec. 30.—(The Editor.) As it is very important in the best interests of the city that the power by-law should carry next Monday, allow me to point out, as has already been explained, the carrying of the by-law simply empowers the council to negotiate with the Hydro-Electric Commission of Ontario.

Should the by-law carry we can only hope that the council will be able to make a satisfactory agreement with the commissioners, but even should the present by-law carry the voters will have another opportunity of voting on the final proposition because the corporation will have to raise between \$10,000 and

\$12,000 to equip our own plant in order to receive the power, no matter from what source or direction it may come.

This is from the report of the expert. As the above expenditure will be on capital account it will be necessary to submit a by-law to the electors in order to sell the debentures to cover this outlay. Therefore the by-law and the Hydro-Electric can be submitted together later on in the year.

I have no hesitation in supporting the by-law and trust the citizens will do likewise.

TO "GET RELIGION."

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 30.—If proper account can be given Governor Jack M. Slaton that Benjamin Merck of Gainesville, Ga., condemned to hang Dec. 29th, can "get religion" in the next thirty days, that length of time in the form of a respite will be granted him.

Merck has been the most disappointing of near converts. He was convicted of wife murder six months ago, and ever since has been just upon the verge of accepting faith, failing to make the goal at the last minute.

Then Merck's spiritual advisers have had to begin all over again. This is the situation at present, and Merck is fearfully anxious to get religion before he goes to the gallows. Thirty days, he contends, is sufficient to make him a real believer.

A delegation from Gainesville, headed by Congressman T. Bell, called on Governor Slaton and asked that he be granted a thirty-day respite in order to make peace with God. Congressman Bell said Merck ought to be hanged as he was undoubtedly gully, but that the man was truly penitent and should be given time to get religion so that he might die as a Christian and not lose his soul.

"I am inclined to grant the respite," said Governor Slaton, "if you gentlemen will assure me that Merck can get religion in thirty days."

MELON LARGE AND JUICY.

Packing Company, Capitalized at \$14,000. Cleared \$4,000,000.
Chicago, Dec. 30.—Objections by council for delay to introduce which the government seeks to introduce regarding the operations of the Kenwood company and the Aetna Trading company, halted the packers' trial to-day and caused Judge Carpenter to excuse the jury, pending the hearing of legal arguments.

The government contends that the Kenwood company, which was organized by the packers in 1900, and continued in business until 1905, was one of the alleged pools used to market the packers' by-products. It is alleged that the Kenwood company dealt in oleomargarine and the Aetna Trading company in the same period, dealt in clematis.

The government intends to show that the Kenwood company's profits were \$4,000,000 in one year, despite the fact that it was only incorporated with a capital stock of \$14,000. The profits of the Aetna Trading company are also alleged to have been proportionately large, by counsel for the government.

FREEZE UP OF GATES

Leading to Canals Caused Trouble in Gananoque.
Gananoque, Dec. 30.—The sudden drop in temperature caused a freeze up of the gates connecting with the canal furnishing water to the factories and a gang of men were at work the greater part of the day clearing gates and rocks, water being let in about 4.30 o'clock.

A Local Instance.

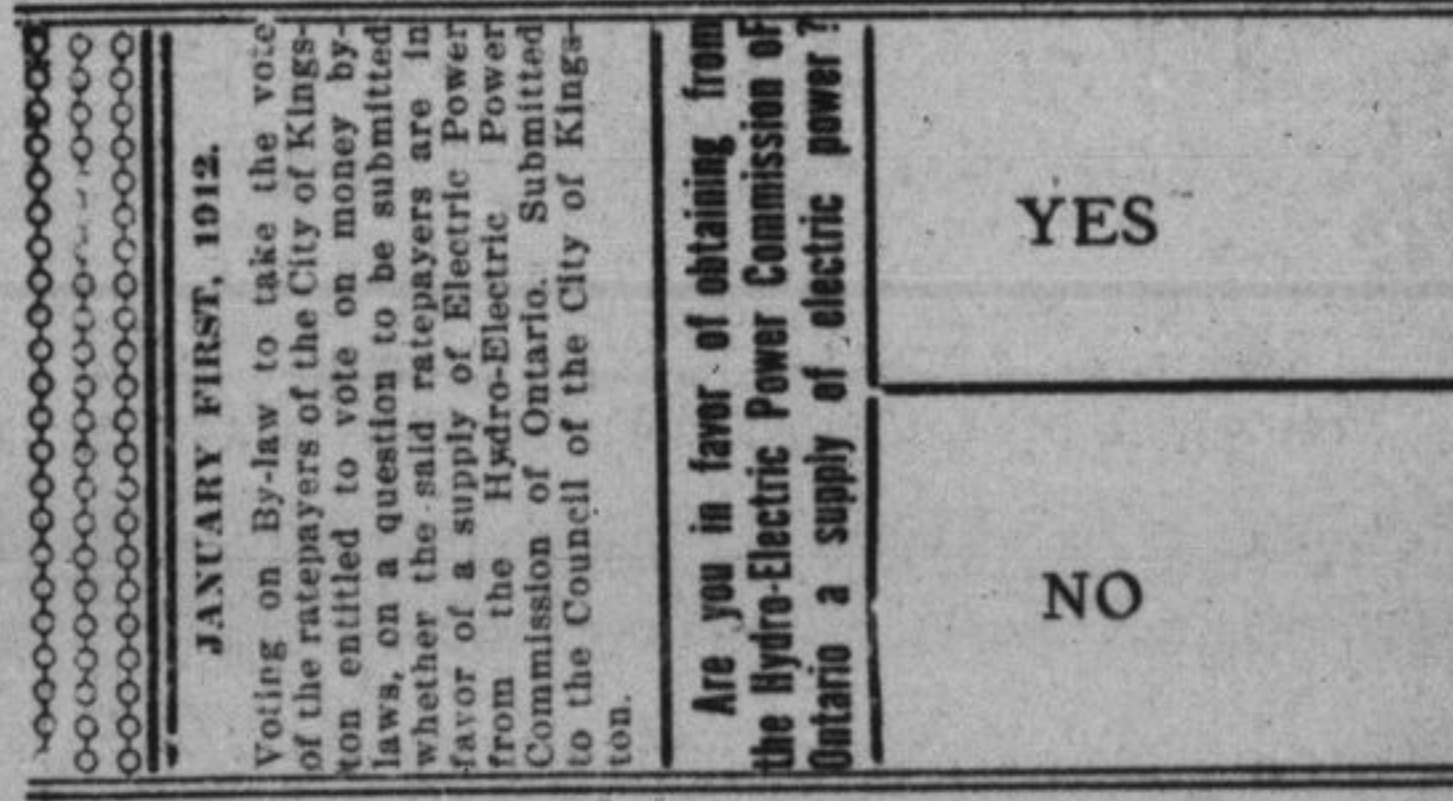
