SUNDAY SCHOOL RALLY

HELD IN SYDENHAM STREET METHODIST CHURCH.

Most of the City Sunday Schools Attended—Inspiring Addresses Were Given.

A mass meeting of the officers, teachers and scholars of the Sunday schools was held in Sydenham street Methodist church Sunday afternoon. This large auditorium was crowded and chairs had to be carried into the gallery. The schools represented were: Chambers, Cooke's, Cassin street, Sydenham street, Brock street, Princess street, First and Second Baptists, First Congregational, Bethel Calvary, and the depot.

Among those on the platform were: Rev. Dr. Macgillivray, Alexander Laird, T. W. Neal, S. Sebery, J. Weeater, H. D. Whitmore, D. Laing, and D. G. Laidlaw, Robert Meek, George Mills, B. Davis, T. F. Harrison, John McEwen, J. W. Corbett and Dr. Lake.

D. G. Laidlaw was chairman. The singing of such familiar hymns as "Stand Up, Stand Up, for Jesus," "Throw Out the Life Line," and "Hark, 'Tis the Shepherd's Voice I Hear," was very hearty. This part of the service was led by a choir composed of adult members of the schools.

Rev. D. Laing led in prayer and the creed was repeated in concert.

The chairman, after a few apt remarks, called upon T. F. Harrison, for the first address. Mr. Harrison, based a concise ten-minute address on the word "big." Among the big things he mentioned was the bigness of the Sunday school. He emphasized the fact that there are more men connected with the Sunday schools than all other brotherhoods and Christian societies in the world put together. It was an inspiration for the younger members. The speaker also pointed out the big objective character building. The Sunday school is the greatest citizen-producing agency in the universe, and is the producer of Christian workers. It stands for the best interests of the home, the church, and country.

Robert Meek, in his address, on the "Objective for 1912," placed a high and very worthy aim for the scholars. One of the aims should be that the Sunday schools be made a training school for usefulness. The fires should be kept aglow. An objective which Mr. Meek emphasized strongly, and hopes will soon be realized, was to make the school a point of attraction. He said, in connection with church port, a place should be provided which would always be open, that the young could come and enjoy themselves, read, play games, and make their friendships. The evil counter-attractions of to-day would then have competition. The speaker also dealt upon the activity of men in the schools. Lastly, Mr. Meek spoke of the dignity of teaching. There is no bigger calling on earth than to be engaged in the King's business. To

have the opportunity to mould the character of the future generation was a great privilege, and the teachers, he believed, are inspired from on high for this noble service.

Rev. H. T. Whitmore, pastor of Calvary church, gave a very impressive address on "Consecration." He pointed out that the teachers and scholars should resolve to more truly consecrate themselves to the work of the Sunday schools during 1912. He deplored the absence of family prayer in the home, and asked for the practical sympathy and support of the parents.
