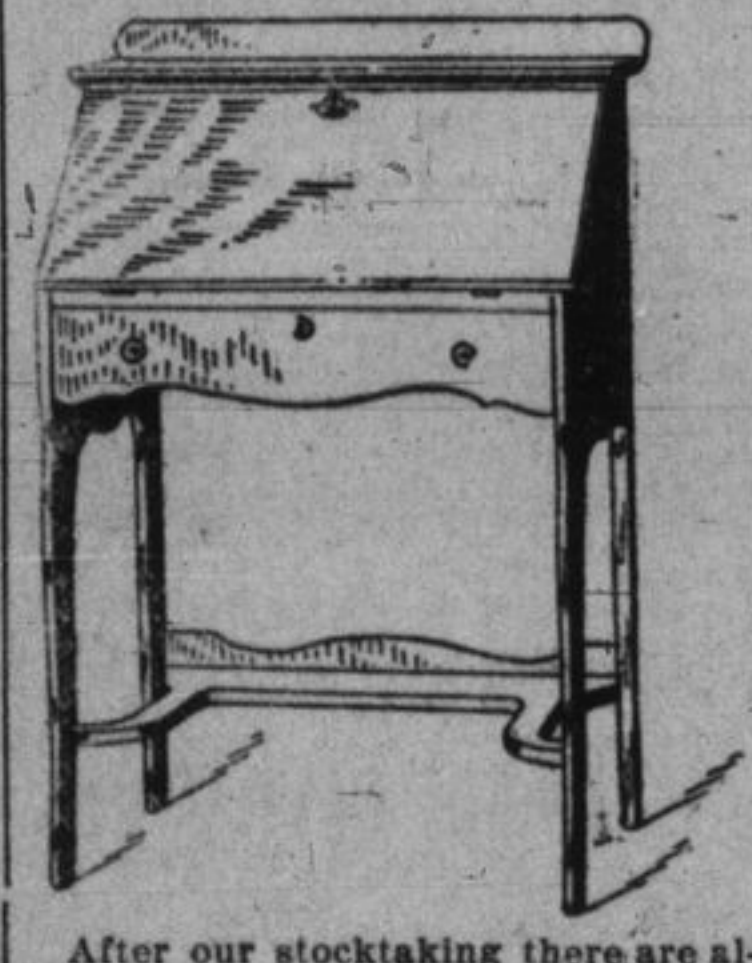

OLD CASE RECALLED WILL NOT RAISE RATES

JOSEPH DEVINE ACCUSED AS SAULTING CHARLES SELBY. ALTHOUGH COST OF MAINTENANCE IS INCREASING.

Accused Gave Himself up to Police, and Entered Plea of "Not Guilty"—Alleged Assault Occurred on May 5th Last—Case Enlarged For a Day.

Joseph Devine gave himself up to the police today to answer to a charge of assaulting Charles Selby, on the evening of May 5th last. Devine pleaded "not guilty," when arraigned before Magistrate Farrell, but after the evidence of the prosecution had been secured the case was enlarged for a day in order to allow the accused to get the evidence of a witness. A. B. Cunningham appeared for Mr. Selby.

Selby told of driving down to Richardson's wharf to see about some work he was doing on the steamer Fort Colborne. He was accompanied by John Kelly. Selby and Kelly both gave evidence. Selby told of Devine and another man being together on the wharf, and about being kicked and otherwise badly used by Devine and his companion. Mr. Kelly told about being pushed into the slip and how he was probably saved from drowning by falling into a small boat.

The evidence of Dr. Hanley, who attended Selby, was to the effect that Selby had one rib fractured, another badly injured, his nose battered and otherwise badly used up. Selby had great trouble in breathing. Dr. Hanley was accused of being drunk, but he stoutly denied the charge.

"I was on my way to work," he said, "when I slipped on the road."

The evidence of Constable Wilson was that the accused was very drunk and a fine of \$5 and costs were imposed with the option of one month's imprisonment.

His lawyer was very vocal at the sentence and left the court room saying that Kingston was a poor town to live in anyway.

The case of William Wood is very sad. He is very old, minus one arm, and to make matters worse he drinks very heavily. He was given a good home at the House of Industry, but when in his cups he could not be kept there. The magistrate gave him a month.

"I am dying," said Wood, in a weak voice, as he passed out of the courtroom. His case is a most pitiable one.

General Hospital Governors Meet—Are Confident That Money for New Wing Will Soon be Secured.

The monthly and also quarterly meeting of board of governors of Kingston General Hospital was held on Wednesday afternoon. F. G. Lockett presided. Other members present were: Prof. Marshall, J. A. Minnes, H. E. Kent, A. F. Chown, H. P. Bibby, Lieut.-Col. Massie, F. Spangenberg, R. Uglow, Dr. R. E. Sparks.

It being the end of the first quarter of the hospital year, a financial statement was presented, which, owing to the high price of all foodstuffs and other commodities, showed a considerable increase in the cost of maintenance. However the board was unanimous in its desire to continue as long as possible the present charges without any increase. The number of patients for the past three months has been in excess of the same period last year, which, considering the healthy condition of the city at the present time, was considered very satisfactory from a hospital standpoint.

The medical superintendent's report was full of interest, giving the number of patients received and discharged and the various diseases which were treated.

The visiting governors' report was brought in by Prof. D. H. Marshall, his co-visitor, William Anderson being unable to attend. They had before long, a very careful inspection during the month of December, of the whole hospital and found everything in excellent condition and order, so much so that they gave practically no recommendations for improvements to the board.

J. A. Minnes, chairman of the committee for the new wing, brought in a very satisfactory report. The committee has received splendid encouragement from the generous citizens of Kingston, and it certainly looks as if before long, new wing will be in the course of erection. At the present buildings are often taxed to their utmost, and more accommodation is a need that has been felt for some time, the board received the report of this committee with enthusiasm.

The annual report for 1911 is now ready and will be distributed to all interested in the hospital work. Anyone desiring a copy and not having one sent to them may secure one at the office of the hospital.

The committee of management, in its report, mentioned a number of donations in money received from friends of the hospital at Christmas time, as well as many other gifts, including turkeys, geese, oranges, apples, grapes and confectionery.

These will be gratefully acknowledged in due time.

The visiting governors appointed for the present month are Dr. R. E. Sparks and Abraham Shaw.

Say They Will Resign.

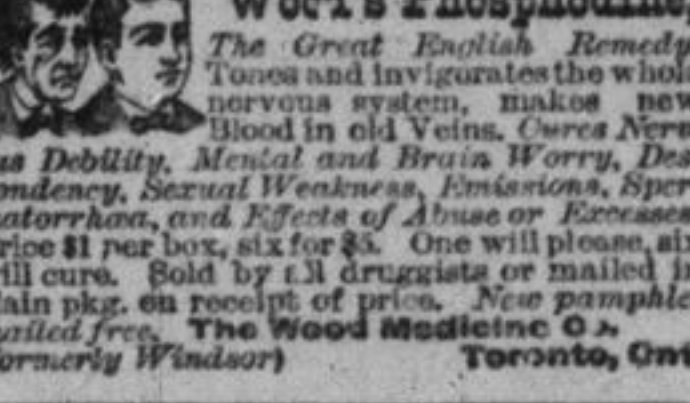

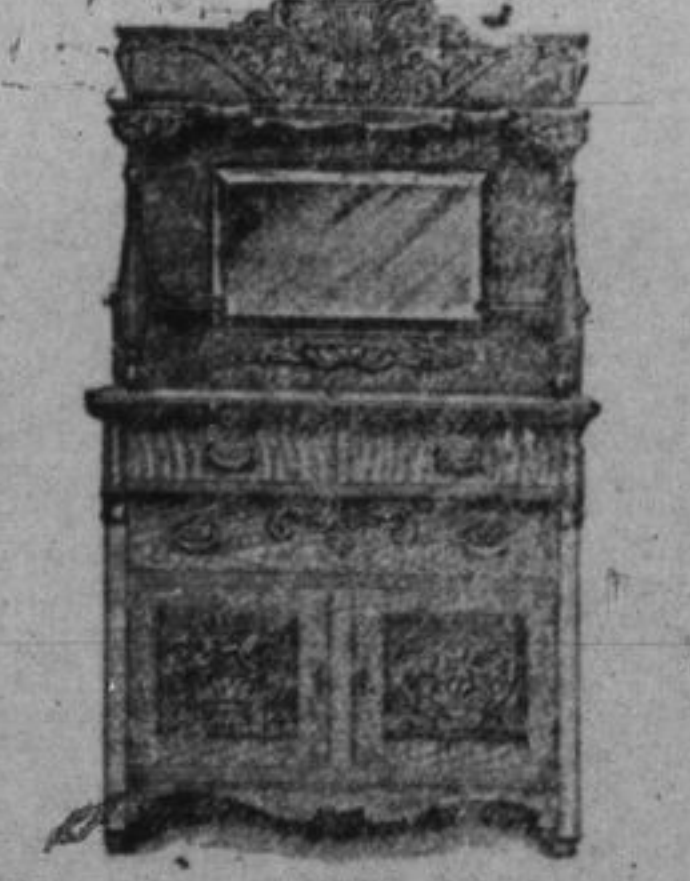
