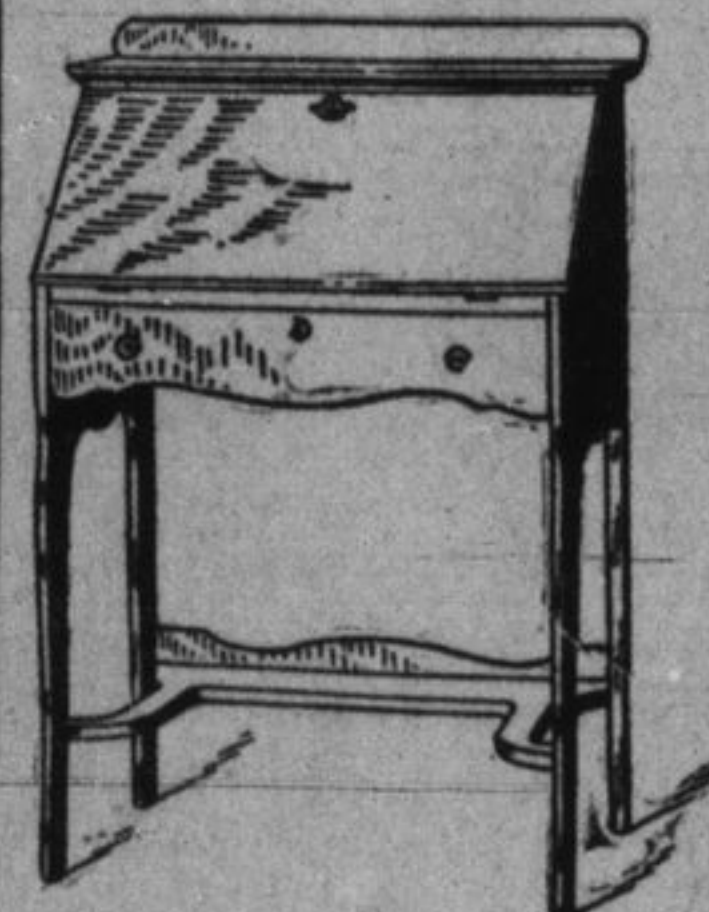

## SPORTS AT QUEEN'S

### THE OPEN AIR RINK ABOUT READY FOR USE

#### Students Preparing For Assault-at-Arms—Two Kingston Players on Queen's Basketball Team.

The open-air rink at Queen's will open very soon. To-day is about the first good day that the men in charge have had for making ice. The hose was put on the rink at about four o'clock on Friday morning and by night it is expected there will be good ice. Last year the rink was fine, and it is expected that the rink will even be better this winter. A hockey schedule was drawn up by those in charge last night. The facilities were given the first choice of the hours for practice, and the years come next, according to seniority. The boarding-houses will also get hours for practice. Queen's will have the best ice in the city when the rink gets in working order.

The Queen's basketball team is getting in shape for its first game in Montreal, on January 12th. The team looks now as if it will be the best college has had in a long time. Kingston will be well represented on the team from the look of things. Two local boys, namely, "Shorty" Pound and Leslie Meek, will likely get places on the team. Both of these fellows play on the science '13 team, which is looked upon as being the best in the college.

The new wrestling mat that Queen's has bought for the gymnasium, has arrived, and was used for the first time on Thursday.

All the students interested in the assault-at-arms which is to take place soon, are in training. Last year the boys did not start to train until after the Christmas holidays for the Intercollegiate assault-at-arms, but this year they started to get in trim as soon as they got into college. The boys last year won a number of the events, but this year they are out to win everything, and if training will do it, they should succeed.

Included in the Almanac for 1912 are two engraved maps of the provinces of Manitoba and Alberta and Saskatchewan. Size of each map about 8 x 11 inches. These maps show all the railways and principal towns, and are lithographed in colors. The price is 60c.

### IN MARINE CIRCLES.

#### The Harbor Will Soon be Closed to Navigation.

The tug Frontenac took the steamer acceptor to the Kingston dry-dock on Friday afternoon. The report will have some work done on her during the winter.

The sloop Belle Mahope, of Clayton, which arrived in port on Thursday, loaded logs, cleared again for Kingston on Friday morning. It certainly is very late in the season to see a boat of her style in commission. She not only had to contend with the wind but also the ice in the harbor.

The steamer Wolfe Islander's trips are nearing an end, and if the weather keeps up as it is at the present time, it will be doubtful if she will be able to get over to the city next week. The captain reports that he experienced quite a time getting from Wolfe Island to Garden Island. The ice in some places is from three to four inches thick. If this weather keeps up, the boat will not be able to get from one island to the other on Saturday morning. The boat brought a number of cattle from Wolfe Island over for city butchers on Friday afternoon.

The steamer New Island Wanderer had a large crowd on her trip from the Cape on Friday morning. She had to go around the foot of the island on account of the Hattreau channel being frozen solid.

Bushell re-elected as president; John Baker, of Cataract, vice-president; E. K. Purdy, secretary-treasurer. John Waits, the retiring secretary, was presented with a suitable gift by the members, in appreciation of the work he has done while in office.

### FIRST COLD SNAP.

Thermometer Registered 7.8 Above Zero This Morning.

### ASHORE IN A STORM

#### STEAMER WOLFE ISLANDER LOST ITS COURSE

During the Brief But Heavy Snowstorm Early Thursday Evening—It Was Released on Friday Morning.

Between five and six o'clock Thursday evening, as the steamer Wolfe Islander was trying to pick her way to Brophy's wharf, during the thickest of the snow storm, she ran ashore just below the wharf. The captain lost his bearings and the boat went on quite hard. Word was sent to the Calvin company at Garden Island, and the tug, Frodoene was sent to the rescue. The boat was liberated about ten o'clock, none the worse for the experience, and she was back on her trip this morning.

A span of ice is now stretching from Garden to Wolfe Island. The steamer Wolfe Islander was able to break through this morning, but if the cold weather continues, she will not be able to do so much longer.

There are eight new members—Grant Grimshaw, W. J. Franklin, J. M. Stoney, Charles Ruttan, John Fisher, B. Gordon, J. Hawkey and H. A. Calvin. Messrs. Calvin, Franklin, Stoney and Fisher have served in the council before.

### Science and Breakfast Table.

Near Picton a series of experiments are in progress. The inventor of the new dairy product is George W. McMullen, and he and his brother have erected an experimental plant in which the process of saving in food form the total quantity of the solids contained in milk is now being tested.

Mr. McMullen points out that in every hundred pounds of milk there are thirteen pounds of solids. In butter there are but four and a half pounds of the milk solids for every hundred pounds of the milk, and in cheese only eight or nine pounds, the remainder of the thirteen pounds of milk solids being lost in the making. Mr. McMullen, by a patented process of evaporation, saves the entire thirteen pounds of solids in the form of a new dairy product. It is somewhat more compact than butter, but may be spread on bread. It does not "go bad" quickly, and under proper conditions will keep for years.

This new foodstuff is expected to fill a long felt want. The cost of butter in winter, even in Canadian cities, rises almost to prohibitive prices. Many people are forced to use substitutes that do not contain anything like the food value of butter. But the McMullen process will give the farmer a better price for milk than the cheese or butter factories can pay, and will give the consumer a larger quantity of dairy product for less money than butter costs. Science applied to the extraction of the total quantity of the solids in milk will prove as beneficial to the consumer as to the producer, because they will divide between them the saving following upon the application of scientific principles.

### Died at Glenvale.

The death occurred at Glenvale on Thursday of Miss Mary L. Leatherland, of that place. She had been sick for some little time. The deceased was thirty-seven years old. The funeral will take place on Saturday.
