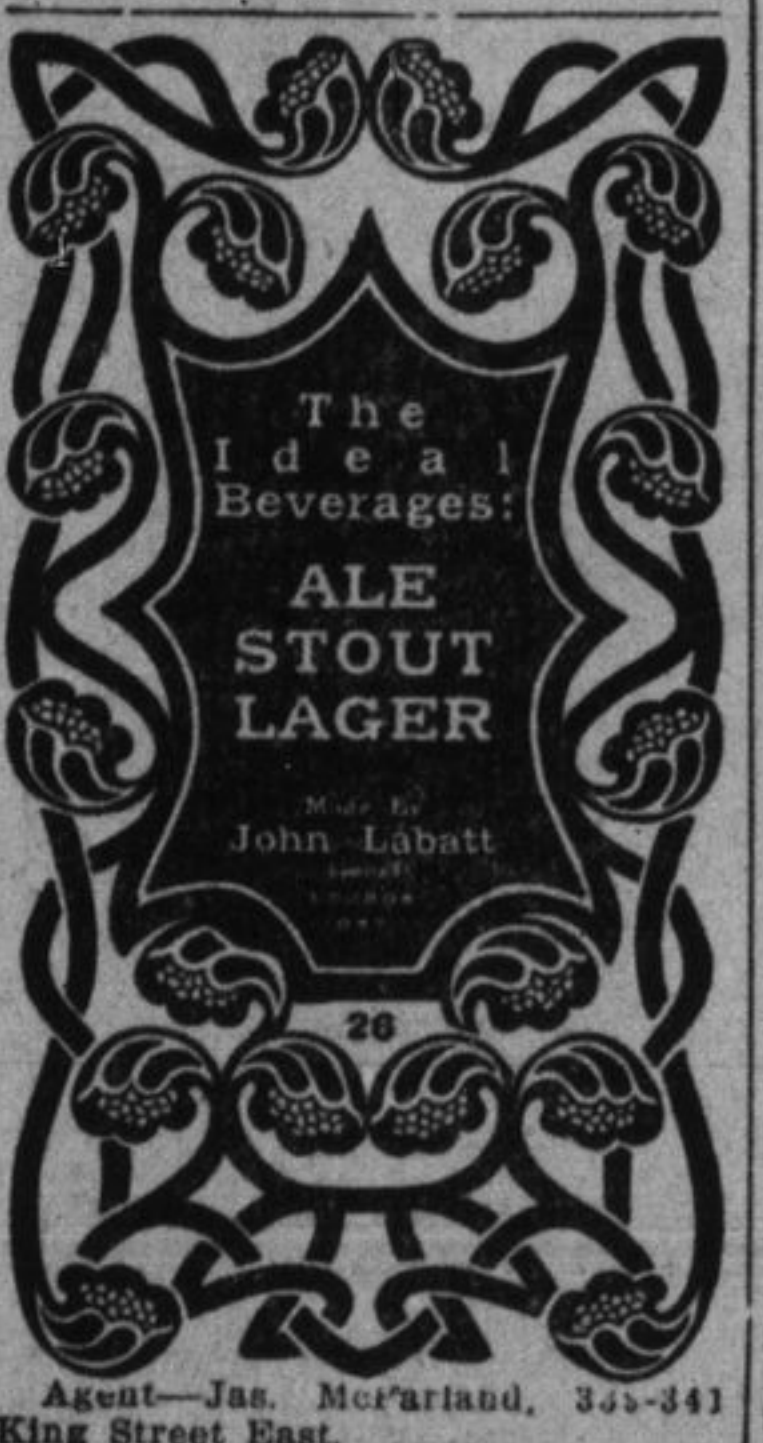

GUILTY OF ASSAULT

JOSEPH DEVINE HEAVILY FINED BY MAGISTRATE.

Penalty Imposed Was \$20 and Costs or One Month in Jail—Magistrate Had No Doubt as to His Guilt.

At police court, on Friday morning, Magistrate Farrell found Joseph Devine guilty on the charge of assaulting Charles Selby, near Richardson's wharf, on the night of May 5th last, and imposed a fine of \$20 and costs, or one month in jail.

The case came up in police court, Thursday morning, but was enlarged for a day, in order that the defence might secure additional evidence. One witness was heard, evidence being given by Capt. Chauncey Daryeau, of the schooner Ford River, who happened to be down at the wharf, at the time the row occurred.

Devine went in to the box on his own behalf and claimed that Selby had been the main aggressor in the row.

After summing up all the evidence, however, the magistrate said that he had not the least doubt in his mind, as to the guilt of the accused. He was quite satisfied that Selby and Kelly had given the correct story of the affair. Devine's companion, however, was the one who had started the row, in the first place, but Devine had been willing to take a hand in the fight when it was started, and there was no justification, whatever, for his conduct. He would, therefore, impose a fine of \$20 and costs, or one month.

It pays to have a good record. Robert Powell admitted stealing an overcoat from the Revere hotel, when he was arraigned a week ago, and the magistrate remanded him for a week in order that his record might be looked up. Powell found that it was a good thing to have a good record as the magistrate remarked that he had made an investigation, and had found that this was the first time the accused had been before the court on such a charge as this.

"Your trouble is from the old, old cause," continued the magistrate, which brings so many young men to the court. He had reference to his love for strong drink. When arraigned the accused had stated that he had been drinking, and that he did not know that he had stolen the coat.

As Powell had spent a week in jail on remand, the magistrate considered that this was sufficient punishment and allowed him to go.

"I am showing you leniency," this time," remarked the magistrate, "but I hope that you will try and get control of yourself and that you will turn over a new leaf for good."

Powell left the court room with tears in his eyes. He felt his position keenly.

WILL ISSUE PAMPHLET.

And Locomotive Works Business Will be Faithfully Presented.

Hon. William Hartly, when asked as to the statement issued, yesterday, by Aemilius Jarvis & Co., of Toronto, intimating that he had nothing to say beyond the fact that whatever shares were submitted to Mr. Jarvis, in June last, while negotiations for sale were on hand, they were not issued by him and he was not cognizant that they were submitted in connection with the transactions that resulted in the formation of the new company. He did not purpose washing any dirty linen for the satisfaction of the public. Mr. Jarvis could have the monopoly of that business, but he did purpose to place before every shareholder of the company a detailed statement of discussions that occurred at the shareholders' meeting when the matter as to profits, etc., was thoroughly threshed out face to face. An accurate account of the discussion was taken by a Hansard reporter, and this will be issued in pamphlet form, to every shareholder, as well as to newspapers that had given publicity to the matter at issue. It was a plain presentation of a business matter in a business way.

Mr. Hartly will likely go to Toronto early next week to have the pamphlets prepared for issuance. This statement, when issued, will place the matter before those concerned and he confidently rests his case on its publication.

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UNCONSCIOUS IN HIS SHACK.

Former Kingston Boy III Ten Days Before Discovered.

The leader, of Davidson, Saskatchewan, contains the following account of the death of the late R. P. Arnie, whose remains were recently brought to the family home in Kingston for burial:

"Life on the prairie is not all romance. On December 3rd, H. P. Arnie, a young man residing on section 33-23-11w3, was found in his home—stagnant, sick and delirious, by a neighbor, J. Moffat. As near as can be ascertained young Arnie had been on his homestead a month and ten days previous to being found, had taken his ponies to the Lans boys for them to keep while he put up a barn. When Mr. Moffat found him he had evidently been sick about ten days; had no water in the shack, and though he had lots of provisions he was unable to get any, but had been gnawing at a sack of flour standing near the bed.

"He was at once removed to the home of the Messrs. Lams and put into the hands of Mrs. R. P. Brooks, an able and trained nurse, who fortunately lived in the neighborhood. The poor lad was given every care, but to no avail. He never regained consciousness and died on December 14th.

"An uncle, Mr. Storey, of Regina, was sent for and came up, but the poor boy did not know him. The mother is living at Kingston, Ont. The remains were taken to Elbow and from there to Regina by Messrs. Brooks and Lams, thence they were sent on to Ontario. What a sad home-coming! Gloom has been cast over the whole neighborhood. Young Arnie had an exceptionally fine character."
