REPLY OF MR. HARTY TO THE STATEMENT OF JARVIS AND COMPANY.

The Ex-President of the Canadian Locomotive Company Shows That He Was Not Responsible for Jarvis' Prospectus.

The following statement has been sent to the press by Hon. William Harty in reply to the letter of Amelius Jarvis & Co., regarding Canadian Locomotive Company affairs.

It is not true that the difficulty over the estimated profits grew out of any estimate made by Mr. Harty. It grew out of an estimate made by the auditors of Jarvis & Co.

The Jarvis Prospectus.

It is not true that the prospectus issued by Jarvis & Co. in June last contains any estimate by Mr. Harty of the profits of the company for the ensuing year, as appears by the prospectus itself, but Jarvis & Co., no doubt, have on their files a copy of the letter they asked Mr. Harty to sign for the purpose of the prospectus.

It is true that in September Mr. Harty was told by Mr. Jarvis that Jarvis & Co. could not realize on the bonds of the company unless the \$105,000 was put up to supplement the earnings of the company.

It is true that Mr. Harty declined to be a party to this arrangement, and in his letter to Mr. Jarvis of the 7th of November, stated: "I am unable to understand in what way the sum of \$105,000 can be introduced into the company's books as profits upon a contract which can readily be shown to have finished with a loss."

Position of Treasurer. It is not true that Mr. Harty threatened the directors of the treasurer of the new company, as appears by the following letter:

January 5th, 1912. Hon. William Harty, Kingston, Ont. Dear Mr. Harty:—In response to your request I beg to say that I do not understand the reference in the Toronto Star of January 4th, which reads in part as follows: "And that he (Mr. Harty) threatened the directors of our treasurer because he had refused to execute orders for Mr. Harty in connection with the liquidation of the old company, with which the new company had nothing to do."

Mr. Harty's Retirement. The real cause of Mr. Harty's retirement was the difference between Mr. Jarvis and himself on questions of business policy. Mr. Jarvis is a stockbroker and promoter; he apparently viewed the business from the standpoint of the market for securities.

It will be sufficient to say that so far as I am concerned, I would prefer to be relieved of the presidency of the new company, which you were good enough to have me appointed to a couple of weeks since, and I think in the company's interest it is better that that change should be effected early, rather than late.
