McGILL DESPAIRS OF A VICTORY IN MONTREAL.

Does Not Think It Can Win From Queen's—S.S.A.A.A. to Receive Entries For Hockey Teams.

The McGill hockey squad is working hard to get in shape for the opening inter-collegiate hockey match in Montreal, Friday night, when Queen's team plays there. Gathering from the newspaper reports, McGill does not expect to be able to withstand Queen's onslaught long enough to pull out a victory. They seem to have gained the impression in the French city that the tri-color bunch are mighty strong, and they are not far off in their guess. They are being warned that Queen's is not in the same class with the teams McGill encountered across the border, and will have to use all their energies to play the game. McGill team is fairly well balanced, but seems to be weak on the wings. They are having nightly practices, but on Wednesday had one between twelve and one o'clock.
Queen's management is not neglecting even the smallest detail in connection with getting the team in shape for the opening game, and fans and supporters are confident that the boys from "the old city" will uphold the reputation Kingston has for hockey when they journey down to Montreal for the opening contest. A large number of followers of the game expect to go down with them.

On Saturday afternoon, the Mount Cheneby Nidgets are to play the Glenburnie Garnets on the latter's rink. There may also be a game the same afternoon between two Kingston teams at the Glen rink.

A meeting was called last Thursday night, but through some mistake no one was present to call the meeting together. Several teams have signified their intention of entering, so a good schedule should be arranged. As soon as the entries are in a committee will draw up the schedule and present at the next meeting.

The officers of Queen's tennis club are to meet this afternoon to wind up the business of the coming year. The report of the past season's work will be given and commented upon.

Frontenac's Next Game.
The junior Frontenac hockey team will not be given much chance to get rusty. They played last Friday night here, last night in Belleville, and next game is here, Monday night. Trenton is the visiting team and with the practice the local team gets between now and then, a good game may be expected.

Millan Eligible to Play.
According to Manager John Marshall, of Queen's Hockey Club, Joe Millan, the fast Frontenac wing man, is quite eligible to play with the university seven, and the fact that he has been out practising for the last two days seems to strengthen the fact that he is intended that he shall play with Queen's. He is registered as a matriculated student, and as such has a perfect right to play, according to the City Hockey League.

Collegiates Had Work-out.
The K.C.L. junior intercollegiate hockey team held its first practice at the covered rink Wednesday evening, from seven to eight o'clock. "Jimmie" Stewart was the only one of last year's team to be out this winter. Some of the promising ones are "Charlie" Stewart, the K.C.L.'s junior city league wizard goalkeeper; Brownfield and Roger Stewart, Harry Cook, "Punch" Derry and "Mike" Milo. A number of the juniors were on the job too, among them being "Baldy" E. Ford, George Smith, Len Smith, G. Mills, Howard Williams, Clarence Young and Hugh Toland. The team this year will be very light, the heavy material having graduated into senior company.

Ottawa Journal.
Canada's area of peat bog, 37,000 square miles, constitutes a potential national asset of enormous value, according to a circular just issued by the Canadian Peat Society.
Four bogs, within a few miles of Ottawa, are estimated to contain over 25,000,000 tons of fuel.
It also pointed out that Ontario and Quebec send annually \$20,000,000 to the United States for coal, and that the development of peat-bog in this country would keep this money at home as well as supply additional work to Canadian labor.
Spending some national time and money on investigating the possibilities of this asset is worth while.
