ANNUAL MEETING SHOWS STRONGER POSITION.

Best Account Now Exceeds Paid-up Capital by \$1,000,000—Splendid Increases Shown in Every Department.

At the annual meeting of the Bank of Toronto, a full report of which will be found on page seven, Duncan Colquhoun, the president, referred particularly to the increase of the account of the bank to \$5,000,000, making it now \$1,000,000 in excess of the paid-up capital.

The general statement submitted showed increases in every department of the bank's business. The profits for the year were equal to 10.47 per cent. on the average paid-up capital as compared with 14.74 per cent. for the previous year.

The deposits increased \$4,140,944, and now stands at \$41,126,664, while loans and investments now aggregate \$39,322, an increase for the year of \$5,003,692.

The bank purchased this property when it opened for business in Kingston a little over two years ago, but leases then existing did not expire until the coming first of May, so that occupation could not sooner be secured.

OCCULT POWER USELESS.

American Adventuress in Berlin Sentenced For Fraud.

Berlin, Jan. 13.—The trial of Viola Scott, an American woman who was charged with frauds, came to an end, to-day, and she was sentenced to eighteen months in prison. As she has been in jail for two months, the time to be served is reduced to sixteen months.

Mrs. Scott carried on a large fraudulent business in Berlin through the sale of books, which were alleged to give instructions for the attainment of mysterious powers. One of the books told of how an enemy could be rendered powerless by continued staring at the bridge of his nose.

Mrs. Scott's divorced husband carried on a similar business in Berlin and was arrested. He jumped his bail of \$20,000. The trial of Mrs. Scott was begun on January 2nd. The amount she obtained by her frauds was \$10,000.
