TROPICS OF CANADIAN NORTH
WHY LAND REGULATIONS.
ANY PERSON WHO IS THE SOLE owner of a family or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. If by proxy, made at any agency on certain conditions. By father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of titled or homesteader.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of the homestead or farm of a least 30 acres solely owned by either son, daughter, brother or sister.
In certain districts a homesteader is allowed standing timber on a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price is 50¢ per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption of the homestead after obtaining the required 6-month residence. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a part based homestead. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead for six months in each of three years. Cultivate City acres and open a house worth \$200.00.

URGES LOVE-MAKING IN SCHOOLS

Teaching of Child-Rearing is of More Importance Than Courses in Live-Stock Breeding.

A despatch from Topeka, Kansas, says: "That the average farmer knows more about putting hogs on the market and how to prepare them to bring the best prices, and that the average business man knows more about putting his goods on the market than either does about raising their children, is the accusation of Prof. W. McKeever, professor of philosophy at the Kansas Agricultural College.
Professor McKeever regards life as a day society, and when the next legislative session meets he will urge an appropriation for each of the big state schools that courses in child-rearing to put the "kiddies" on an equal footing with the pigs and cows and chickens in the barn-yard, and with the silks and satins of the merchant, shall be established.
"Business is an exact science," said Prof. McKeever the other day, on a visit to his brother in Topeka. "Teaching raising is also an exact science. The merchant knows the value of certain qualities of hogs, of a certain blood strains in pigs and cows and chickens. The stock peddler is worth millions to the stockmen of the country."
"What's the pedigree of a baby worth?" Did you ever stop to think that the pedigree of a small boy might be worth dollars and cents to him and to others in the future, and besides that, be worth much in things money cannot buy—happiness, society and the respect of the fellow-man? The business man is exceedingly particular about the pedigree of the stock he puts on his shelves, and the farmer guards with jealous care the pedigree of his stock, but neither one seems to care a whoop about

their children or their grandchildren. "Child rearing is the same old hazardous, hit or miss, guesswork sort of an affair, while business and stock raising are exact sciences. It is time child rearing was put on a scientific basis, too. Of how much value will goods or stock be in the future if the quality of the men and women is lowered?
"Every college ought to teach child rearing and make it a required course of study for every boy and girl. Every school ought to have a course in matrimony to teach boys and girls the good points in each other.
"Science has developed certain propositions regarding the physical and mental activities of a person whereas, it is possible to tell, almost to a certainty, just what the offspring will be. Young people should be taught what to look for in the physical appearance of a boy or girl that would tend to make the children strong, healthy and active, and what to watch for in the mental activities to determine, in advance, the mental activities of the children.
"A boy or girl meets one of the opposite sex and falls in love because the boy has good clothes and apparently a good physique and the girl falls in love with a doll face and a picture hat, and the child of the pair develops into a criminal or a worthless loafer that is worse than criminal.
"Love-making ought to be an exact science, taught in the public schools, worked out scientifically in every detail and with legal checks on marriage that would prevent the marriage of the unfit.
"One must pass an examination to become a school teacher where the teacher has much to do with the character of the child, but that same teacher can turn around and without any examination or investigation get any girl to marry her or him and they start a home and take chances on the character of the children."
