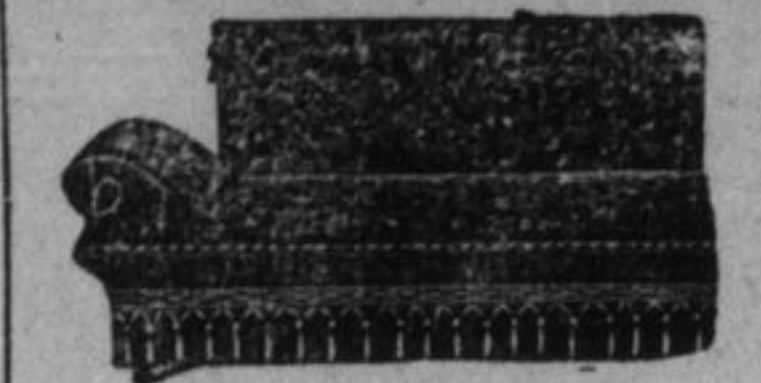

GREAT GAME EXPECTED BETWEEN TEAMS.

Toronto Oarsmen Will be Fifty Per Cent. Stronger—Four Star Players Being Added—No Referee Decided on Yet.

The senior O.H.A. hockey match here to-morrow night, between Argonauts of Toronto and Frontenacs of Kingston, is being counted upon as likely to be one of the fastest games of the season. With four stars on the line-up who did not play in Toronto, the Oarsmen of the Queen City will present a great lineup here. Frontenacs easily defeated them on their own ice, but the Toronto team will put up a much stronger game here. If Argonauts do not win this game, it will mean that their chances for winning this group are practically gone. Frontenacs must win this game to give them a good send-off, so the fighting will be done with all the strength of both teams. Murphy, Gordon, Whale and Lauser will be a valuable addition to the team, and the local team knows that there is a big job ahead of them here. Manager Sutherland may not be able to be here for the game, having been called to London on business Monday afternoon. The team had a workout Monday night and will rest until the game. Just who the referee will be has not been decided. Secretary Trotter sent a number of names to Toronto to-day and expected an answer from Secretary Hewitt to-night. Stanton may play on Frontenacs' defence in place of Hyland.

OUTLOOK VERY BRIGHT

WITH OTTAWA, SMITH'S FALLS AND KINGSTON RAILWAY.

Representatives of Company Met Members City Council and Board of Trade—Plans Set Out for Approval.

"The outlook is fine, and everything is going along very satisfactorily." This was the good news that U. L. Upson, Ottawa, had to give a Whig representative, who, on Tuesday morning, interviewed him in regard to how the work was getting along with the Ottawa, Smith's Falls and Kingston Railway company, of which he is the general manager.

On Monday night, Mr. Upson, with G. L. Dickinson, of Manotick; ex-Ald. E. P. McGrath, of Ottawa, and ex-Ald. J. S. B. O'Connell, Kingston, directors, met members of the board of trade, civic finance committee and industries committee, of city council, when Mr. Upson gave a full report as regards the work already accomplished, and the plans set forth for the future. The company asked that both the board of trade and the city council endorse the project, and a committee was appointed, consisting of Aids. Shaw, Fair and Givens, from the city council; and Messrs. A. C. Macpherson, J. A. Minnes and J. M. Campbell, from the board of trade, to investigate and report, with a view of endorsing the project. The other members of the delegation gave valuable information, and the delegation made a most favorable impression on the civic bodies.

Mr. Upson, in an interesting manner, pointed out the development of the electric railways in the United States, where there is a regular network of railways, all rendering valuable assistance to the communities through which they run.

The company is at present known as the Ottawa, Smith's Falls and Kingston Railway company, but steps are being taken through the provincial house, to have it changed, to be known as the Ottawa, Rideau Lakes and Kingston Railway company.

Work on the survey has been pushed along as rapidly as possible, and was only stopped a short time ago, by the stormy weather. On the survey work the company is but a short distance from Smith's Falls, and just as soon as possible, in the spring, the work will be taken up again, so that no time will be lost.

It is stated that although the accused denied the charge, the evidence pointed directly towards him, and that a conviction could easily have been recorded had the case been proceeded with.

Latham, last fall, was given a hearing before Magistrate Denoon, who, after hearing the evidence, dismissed the action with costs. The evidence adduced showed that Peters and his father-in-law, Latham, purchased a fur coat each from Charles Hillis, who conducts a harness shop on King street west. The coats were very similar in appearance. The magistrate held Peters took the coat by mistake.
