The people of London, in the municipal election, voted on the question of government by commission, and approved of it by a large majority, and the Hamilton Times quotes Sir James Whitney as saying that he will not countenance the legislation that gives the movement effect.

"Hundreds of municipalities and almost all the press of the province," says the Times, "have sought to secure local option of improvement from taxation. Yet this one reactionary man blocks the way to progress, and declares that there should be no relief of improvement by exemption from taxation. The Whig may be correct in saying that the

ANNUITIES NOT PUSHED.

During the discussion of the old-age pension system an incidental reference was made to the annuities system which was undertaken by the government. The annuities represent a method of saving money which cannot be too highly commended. They are understood by the few, however, and considering the manner in which the people are being educated with regard to them it is not surprising that only five hundred people, in about four years, became identified with them and made investments, 340 in immediate annuities and 213 in deferred annuities.

The late government had all the actuarial calculations made upon which the system was founded. It performed a great and important task and one that will endure forever. But it could not launch the scheme as well as the insurance company whose organization is as complete as it is comprehensive and has annuities as one of its many features. The company has annuities which it sells with life and accident and fire insurance, and the cost is limited because it is spread over all the business.

The government could not afford to advertise its annuities extensively. Some papers advertised them gratuitously. Two or three lectures were employed, and they held meetings at different places and discussed most eloquently upon the annuity system. These lectures have been dismissed by the present government. They were grit, and they had to go irrespective of the service they had rendered.

What new plan is to be adopted now to push the business no one knows, but pushed it must be, by some one, and according to some plan, and the sooner the man and his plan are forthcoming the better for the Borden government. It is up to Mr. White, a financier, and a man of affairs, to evolve some scheme that will let the people know what in old age they may get per annum by the judicious investment of a small sum per week in the early and most lucrative years of their service.

THE MIDDLE MAN AGAIN.

The talk in the larger cities of the United States is that living is made high through the imposition of the middlemen. Mayor Gaynor, of New York, has been investigating the subject, and holds that the middlemen, with all his faults, is a necessity. Mayor Shank, of Indianapolis, says the middleman is a trouble, and that Mr. Gaynor must represent the wealthy class, and reflect their view, or he would not think otherwise.

One observation of Mr. Shank seems to be extravagant. It is: "I believe the middleman is killing himself in getting fictitious prices for foodstuffs. A good many of the producers have become disgusted with present conditions and at times prefer to let their apples, peaches and other fruits rot the ground rather than to give them to commission merchants at a cheap rate. The people are becoming alive to conditions and we are sure to see a change in the near future."

This middleman of Canada are generally the retailers, and they are, as it were, between the upper and the nether grindstones. They have to buy as cheaply as they can to make any margin of profit, and they complain that they are the victims of the trusts. The wholesale men have a similar grievance. They have to give their orders for some foodstuffs, like

Public Ownership Again.

In almost every civilized country on the face of the globe internal telegraphic communications are in the hands of and are operated by the government. This is the case in England, France, Germany, Austria, Italy, Spain and Russia.

The tendency toward the nationalization of public services is so pronounced that on the first day of this very year the British post office took over the plant and business of the National Telephone company.

In short, the maintenance of a country's telegraph service in the hands of private companies or individuals might be regarded almost as a sign of backwardness rather than of progressiveness. Every argument that might be added in favor of a government postal service applies with equal force in favor of a governmental telegraph service.

A Distinguished Police Officer.

Charles Fleming, chief constable of Bradford, is the only Canadian whose name appears on the new year list of recipients of the king's police medal. The medal is awarded for long and efficient service or for specially worthy conduct in the way of duty. In Mr. Fleming's case it was given for thirty-four years' service, "distinguished by very exceptional ability and merit."

Around the World by Wireless.
Oswego Palladium.
France, by an expenditure of \$2,000,000, is preparing a system of wireless stations so that it will be possible to reach all her colonial possessions, and in doing so will be able to send messages around the world. Commissioner Ferris, the well-known engineer in charge of the Eiffel tower plant, is in charge of the technical matters in connection with the plan. It will take between two and three years to erect the twelve wireless stations.

Messages sent out from the Eiffel tower at Paris will first reach the posts erected at Dshomey and Timbuctoo in West Africa. Thence they will cross the continent to the coast of the Red sea at Madagascar. Either of these two posts can then send messages across the Indian ocean to the post in India, at Pondicherry, whence they will be transmitted to the eastern coast of Asia at Saigon. About 5,000 miles separate this point from the Island of New Caledonia to the north of Australia, and this can be covered by a high power station. The Pacific will then be crossed by stations at Tahiti and the Marquesa Islands. It then remains to cross over Central America so as to reach Martinique, in the Atlantic, then crossing the ocean West African coast at Rufisque. From here the circuits around the globe will be completed at Paris.
