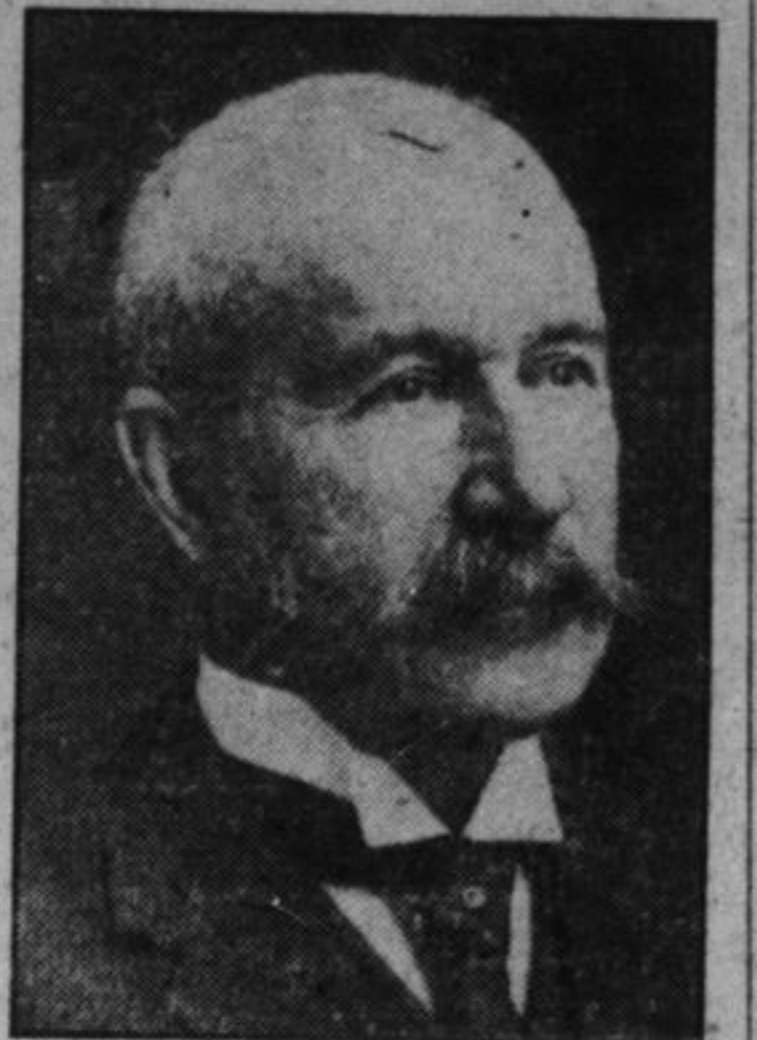
BOARD OF HEALTH QUEEN'S WON DEBATE

ARCHIBALD STRACHAN ELECTED CHAIRMAN FOR YEAR 1912.

Ice Cutting Regulations May be Changed, so as Only Pure Ice Will be Cut—Other Matters Discussed by Board.

At the first meeting of the board of health for the year 1912, held on Monday afternoon, Archibald Strachan was elected chairman.

There was very little business on hand, and the session was a short one. A large list of accounts were passed and the medical health officer reported on several cases, giving the members some desired information.

DEFEATED OTTAWA COLLEGE HERE ON MONDAY EVENING.

Both on Subject Matter and Style—The Judges' Award Was Queen's 85 Points, Ottawa College 79 Points.

Queen's carried off the honors in the intercollegiate debate in Convocation hall on Monday evening against Ottawa College, winning both on subject matter and style, on the former by five points and the latter by one point.

"Resolved, that it would be in jurious to the interests of the united kingdom to ratify the Declaration of London." was the subject of the debate. The hall was well filled, and the students, before the debate and while waiting for the judges' decision, made things lively and interesting by their yell, songs and parodies.

The advisability or inadvisability of the ratification of the Declaration is a very large international question with many sides, but, nevertheless, the arguments and points presented by the Queen's debaters, on the affirmative, were the most forcible.

The chairman of the debate was R. S. Stevens, B.A. Each speaker was allowed twenty minutes for the presentation of his case. The Queen's representatives in the affirmative were W. G. Clark, M.A. and H. McIntosh, while the negative was argued by J. J. Kennedy and F. W. Hackett, for Ottawa College.

The judges were Hon. Justice B. M. Britton, of Toronto, Major F. R. Sedgwick, of the Royal Military College, and J. J. Behan, of this city.

The affirmative was led by W. G. Clark, M.A., who was the first to take the floor and in a well-arranged and delivered speech urged that from numerous points of view this declaration would be injurious to the united kingdom.

J. J. Kennedy, the leader of the negative, next spoke. He met many of the affirmative leader's arguments, and very forcibly pleaded for his side.
