THE NEW WARDEN

Has Been Actively Engaged in Municipal Affairs.

Nelson Webster, warden of the United Counties of Leeds and Grenville, for 1912, has been a familiar figure in and about the precincts of the council chamber for the past four years, and is well qualified in experience and practice to preside over the proceedings of that body with dignity and to the credit of himself.

Born in the township of Front of Leeds and Lansdowne in 1858, Warden Webster is now in his fifty-fourth year. He is an only son of the late Thomas Webster, a pioneer resident of that locality, and the subject of this mention was born and is still residing on the homestead erected by his father near Tully. His occupation is that of a farmer and inheriting traits of activity and thrift from his father, his farm is known as one of the best in the township. Several years ago he was married to Miss Victoria, daughter of the late T. Storey, of Escott, and their union is blessed by a family of twelve children.
