PUT OUT OF BUSINESS.
Promoters of Fraud Schemes Distinct Class of Criminals.
Washington, Jan. 26.—Promoters of fraudulent schemes who had obtained \$77,000,000 from the public, were put out of business during the fiscal year 1911, according to the annual report of Robert S. Sharp, chief inspector of the post office department.
The showing is the most remarkable in the history of the department. During the year 529 individuals were indicted on the charge of using the mails in furtherance of schemes to defraud. Of this number 196 persons were tried and 154 convicted. The schemes investigated were of endless variety, varying as the report indicates, "from the simplest business transaction to a gigantic project involving the sale of worthless stock in fake mining companies and imaginary and fictitious institutions existing only on paper or in the minds of the promoters."
In discussing the multiplicity of schemes to defraud the people, chief inspector Sharp says: "The result of the year's work has developed the fact that these fraud manipulators are a distinct class of criminals, some of them moving in the highest social and business circles."
During the year 2,491 arrests were made. One hundred and twelve postmasters and 267 other employees are included in the list of those arrested.

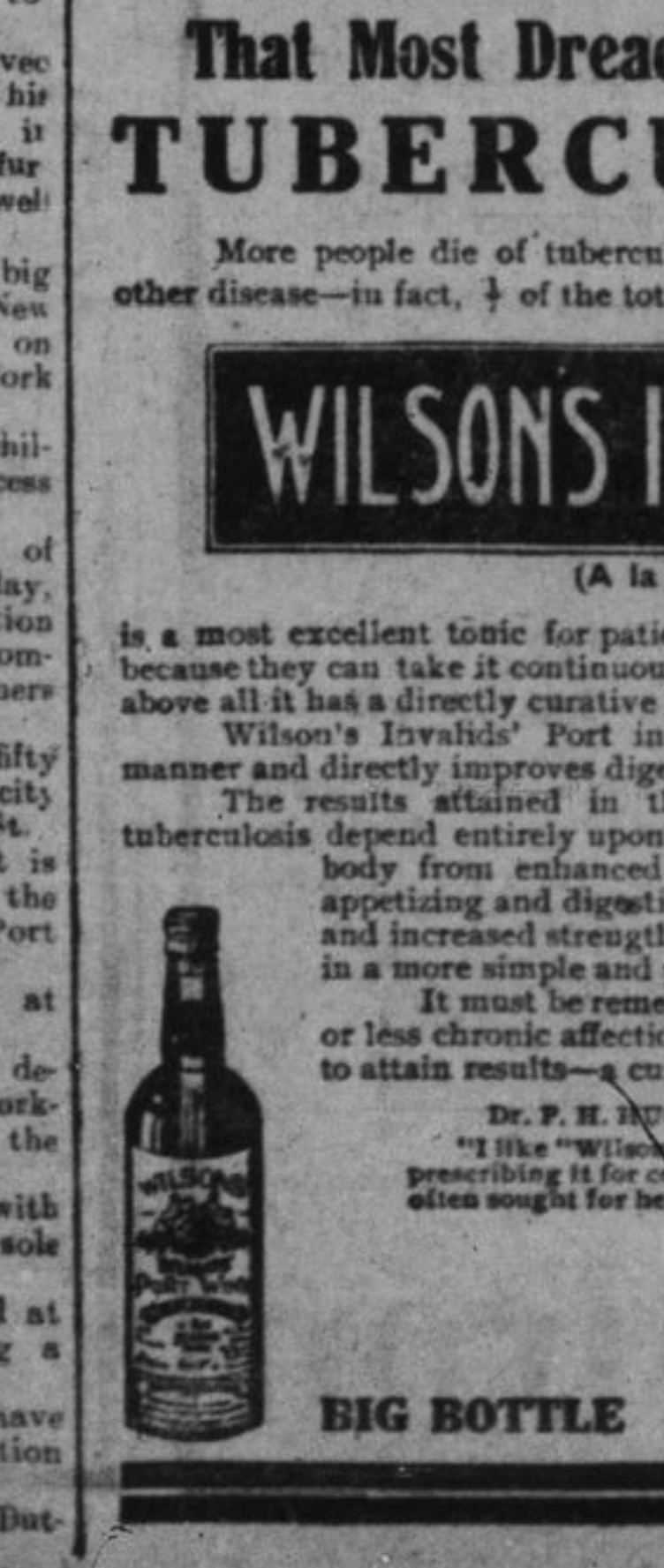
