ONE OF FIRST MEMBERS

OF Kingston Y.M.C.A.—Toronto Octogenarian Writes.

In acknowledging the receipt of a copy of the "Y.M.C.A. News," a Toronto resident over eighty years old, writes as follows to Secretary Trimble:

"I have seen some happy days in Kingston amidst the struggles, I hardly ever forget Kingston with all its struggles and all its loss of its young men. Notwithstanding these negatives, it is 'Happy Old Kingston.'

"The early sixties and up to '06 were active days. In the midst of these days the Young Men's Christian Association was started. I can remember I was there in that room near the foot of Princess street, where some young men from the Montreal association gave the Kingston association its charter. I remember among the Kingston young men who were there was R. V. Rogers, the Chown boys, 'Femie' Robertson, and others who became charter members.

"The watch, which was a gift from the citizens of Kingston, was stolen last summer from Mr. Somerville, one of the boats plying out of Kingston, and he had given it up as lost forever.
