SCHEME ON FOOT TO ABOLISH PRISONER'S DOCK.

Movement Along This Line on Foot in Some Places—There is No Cause for Complaint About Prisoner's Dock at Kingston Police Court.

According to reports there is a movement on in Hamilton and some other cities to do away with the prisoner's dock in the police court, in accordance with the assumption under English law, that a man is not guilty until the crime, with which he is charged, has been brought home to him.

Prisoner's dock is simply a seat provided for the defendant and that it is always safe to have a little rail in front of the man who happens to occupy the seat.

As far as the prisoner's dock is concerned in Kingston there is little cause for complaint for it is simply a long seat for the accommodation of those charged, with a very ordinary railing in front.
