IN HOCKEY CIRCLES PILATE AND JUDAS

BATH ROAD BEAVERS WITHDRAW FROM K.T.H.A.

And Hand Corbett Trophy Over— Cup Was Theirs Had They Won It This Year—Queen's Need a Good Goalkeeper.

William McFedridge, manager of the Bath Road Beavers, twice junior champions of the Kingston Township Hockey League, and up to the present likely winner of the Corbett trophy for the third time, announced, Monday, that owing to the fact that the executive of the league had made it impossible for him to defend the cup for the third time in an open and clean competitive manner, he had withdrawn his team from the league and handed the cup to the secretary of the association.

Charged With Non-Support.

But the Case Was Settled in the Police Court.

A young man was arrested and spent Sunday in the cells on a charge of refusing to support his wife, but a satisfactory settlement was made in police court Monday morning.

It appears that the young man had been working outside of the city but it was claimed by W. F. Nickle, who appeared on behalf of the accused, that while hubby was away the two months he had sent home \$80. For the past couple of months he has been out of work and had been staying with a relative a short distance from Kingston. Under those circumstances the court did not want to press the charge, especially when the husband and wife were on good terms, and chatted together in the court room. The young woman's father did not care to press the charge so it was agreed to adjourn the case if week, the young man in the meantime to get employment and the case against him will be dropped. The magistrate pointed out that the accused must go to work and support his wife, the latter has been kept by her father during the last two months. There is a baby a few months old and the little one was at the police station with the mother.

PREDESTINED THEIR DOWNFALL, SAYS DEAN BIRDWELL.

But We Must Not Blame God For It—An Able Sermon by the Dean on "Fate and Free Will."

After explaining that he had been sent a cutting from the Whig containing the suggestion that Pilate and Judas were "obliged to play the parts assigned to them" in the betrayal and crucifixion of our Lord, the Dean of Ontario, on St. Valentine's Sunday, preaching in St. George's cathedral, a most lucid sermon from the text, "Of-fences hunt unto me, but was unto him by whom I am smitten." "I suppose the cutting was sent me that I might say something on the subject," said the dean, "and I willingly do so, though it is a difficult treat of such a subject in a public press. Turning to Christ's own words, we get light on the question, and we must first clear our minds of the idea that Bible events and characters are to be judged by any different standard from those of our own day. I depart to the use of the term 'playing parts assigned,' thus putting the Bible on the same footing as a play of Shakespeare. Events recorded in the Bible were real, its characters were men of like passions with us. If they were compelled to do as they did, so are we. We must keep all these facts before us and not build up a one-sided theory from a single passage. Our text sets forth the awful reality of sin, and side by side the truth of man's own conclusions.

"Predestination as a theological doctrine has lost its old time way. It was an attempt to explain the existence of evil by the statement that a certain number were, apart from good or evil actions, predestined to salvation or for eternal death. But the reason that it is no longer widely held is that it conflicts with our idea of God and love, who by no stretch of the imagination could wish to condemn the majority of His creatures to damnation quite apart from their individual actions.

It is unlikely that the writer of the newspaper paragraph had in mind this old-time doctrine, but rather a gospel of fatalism which practically denies to man free choice. Fatalism declares that heredity and environment determine a man's actions and that he could know every detail of the character and life of his ancestors, we should be able to predict his actions under certain circumstances. This differs little in the final conclusion from Kismet, the fate of the Mohammedans. If we believe in the fact of compulsion what becomes of moral judgment? Why should we call one action 'good,' another 'evil'?"

"We know why one act is good and another evil, because we know that God has given man free choice, and that it is his own freedom that would be neither good nor evil. God has given us the power and has allowed us to work out our life on 'these God-like lines, the whole basis of the social law and order rests on the idea of man's responsibility, and he receives punishment or reward because he is a free agent. We must not divorce religion and moral action. If a principle is good all over the world we must believe that it was implanted by God, and all acknowledge the principle of man's responsibility is universal.

"To return to our subject, I believe predestination in the lives of Pilate and of Judas, just as it is found in the lives of all of us, and that is the predestination of character.
