## REV. H. D. WHITMORE

HAS RESIGNED AS PASTOR OF CALVARY CHURCH.

He Has Been Called to the First Congregational Church, London, Ont., and Has Accepted.

At the services in Calvary church on Sunday, the following letter was read from Rev. H. D'Arcy Whitmore, who has been pastor of the church for five years:

"My dear people: The painful duty is upon me to tender to you my resignation as pastor of Calvary church. I know this will be a great shock to you all, as it is as painful for me to take the step that must sever the connection between us."

"I have received a very unanimous call to the First church, London, Ont., and I feel it my duty to accept the call. The need of London is greater than Kingston at this time and I believe God is calling me to that work, and I cannot disobey His call. Nothing but this would make me break the pleasant and perfectly harmonious relationship that now and always has existed between us. While I am your pastor, I am first and always Christ's servant, and throughout my ministry I have ever sought to be willing to be obedient to the leading of His most holy spirit."

"The material advantages attached to the call are no greater than they are here. I am not thinking of material advantages, but of the needs of the church that has been led to send the call."

"For five years I have ministered to you, and in that time I have been permitted to win many to Christ, and administer much comfort in sorrow. They have been years of happiness and blessing, and there have been but few discordant notes to mar the harmony of sincere friendship and sympathy. Today, as a church, you are prosperous in all your departments and I believe the day is not far distant when you will stretch out a greater spiritual life."

"May God bless and guide the coming days, filling you with His holy spirit and endowing you with a larger measure of service for His kingdom."

"I now ask you to free me of my pastoral charge of this church in Kingston by accepting my resignation, to take effect on March 31st, 1912."

"Wishing grace, mercy and peace throughout the coming days, I remain, yours faithfully in the Master's service, H. D'Arcy Whitmore."
