THE SPORT REVIEW

FRONTENAC HOCKEY TEAM NEARLY ALL HOME-BREWS.

A Question Raised as to Playing Intercollegiate Junior Player in the City Hockey League—Notes on Sports.

It is a city of over 400,000 population, battling against a city of 20,000 for the O.H.A. senior championship, and a team picked from all over Ontario pitted against a team which, with but one exception, was raised in Kingston. Daniels, the star goaltender, however, was raised near Sydneyham. Nicholson, Hyland, Brouse, Crawford, Reid, Boyer and Richardson are all Kingston boys. Weicker, the utility wing man, came from the other side of Toronto, but has been here for the past three years. Should the Frontenacs win the championship, it will be heralded with more enthusiasm than if Eaton's were proclaimed victors.

Thinks It's Unfair.

"A Spectator," who witnessed the City Hockey League games at the covered rink, Monday night, asks the question if it is clean sport to allow intercollegiate players to play in junior city league? He makes special reference to the K.C.I. team. The Regiopolis team was composed principally of intercollegiate players also. Whether it is clean sport or not depends upon the view of the executive of the city league, which makes the rules, and if the rules permit the playing of these lads, the other teams should either be satisfied with it, or else see that the rule is changed.

Hockey will be the subject of the meeting of the executive of the S.S.A.A.A., which meets to-night. The financial state of affairs is very low at the present time, and it will take considerable scurrying on the part of the members of the executive to meet expenses.

His arm has been out of the sling for some time and with the aid which has been especially devised to cover his shoulder and protect the weak member, he will be able to play his old position pretty well. His arm will be a trifle weak but practices between now and then will strengthen him pretty well.

"Charlie" Edwards will not go to Toronto with the Frontenacs. This was the statement he made Wednesday. This means that Daniels will play goal for the Kingstons in both final games.

No referee has been decided upon for the first final O.H.A. game in Toronto. A number of names have been submitted for approval and it is likely that a choice will be made to-day or to-morrow. It may be Wendell Wuttlauffer or "Chaucer" Elliott.

Montreal, Feb. 12.—About 950 head of butchers' cattle, 225 calves, 230 sheep and lambs, and 1,575 hogs were sold for sale at the Point St. Charles stockyards to-day.

The offerings of live stock at this market during the week were 1,700 cattle, 350 calves, 350 sheep and lambs and 2,275 hogs.

Trade was good, with no material changes in the price. Frederick Richards paid \$6.85 per 100 lbs. for six of the best steers on the market; pretty good animals sold at from 5c. to near 6c. per lb. and the common stock, 3c. to 4c. per lb.

Calves sold at 3 1/2c. to 5c. per lb. Sheep sold at about 4c. per lb.; lambs at 6c. to 7c. Good lots of hogs sold at about 7c. per lb.
