

## THOUGHT MUCH OF THE CHURCH SERVICES

REV. G. I. CAMPBELL COMING TO QUEEN STREET CHURCH.

He Has Proven a Most Successful Worker in Montreal—Kingston Will Get a Good Pastor.

Special to the Whig. Montreal, Feb. 17.—Rev. G. I. Campbell, newly-chosen pastor of Queen Street Methodist church, will enter the city quite a stranger. "I have only been in Kingston once in my life," declared Rev. Mr. Campbell to the Whig correspondent. "But I have met many Kingston people, and I expect to become very fond of the city."

Rev. Mr. Campbell will leave for Kingston in June, his departure marking the first pastorate he has held outside of Montreal in four years. Before he came here he was pastor of the Bell Street Methodist church in Ottawa.

When Rev. Mr. Campbell came to

Montreal, to take a pastorate in what was then the far and sparsely-settled north end of the metropolis, he found the Fairmount avenue church a struggling and disheartened congregation. The faithful few of the congregation were staid in the face by a rapidly-growing church debt. The members of the congregation were not blessed with any lavish quantities of this world's goods. The church lacked organization, as it lacked many other things. It was a task of no little dimension that the new pastor faced. But he set to work manfully. He organized, he planned, he worked unceasingly and untrigly. He laid his foundation strong, and his ability to organize and his personality combined soon began to tell. Rev. Mr. Campbell's sermons were striking and people began to go to his church in large numbers. His ministerial work was telling, and the membership began to grow. He worked among the young people, devising and planning. In a year the church was on a new footing. In two years it was a totally re-organized congregation, and to-day, financially and spiritually, it is in a flourishing condition. Rev. Mr. Campbell has been secretary of the Montreal conference and at the present time is secretary of the Montreal district. He is popular, forceful, energetic, and untiring. Kingston will, in time, get a notable addition to its ministerial ranks, and Montreal will lose thereby.

### TO TEST ON ICE.

Prof. Gill to Get His Flying Machine Going.

The Queen's Journal says: Considerable interest is being taken in the tests now being conducted on the new aeroplane engine, designed by Prof. Gill for use in the experimental flying machine which he is building. The engine is of the four-cylinder, four-cycle type, and uses gasoline as fuel, and was built under Prof. Gill's supervision in the college work-shop. It is made with a view to lightness and strength and most of the castings are made of aluminum, only the working parts being of steel and these are cut down to a minimum weight. The total weight of the engine is 280 pounds, and it is expected to develop sixty-five horse-power when running at 1,000 revolutions per minute. Prof. Gill expects to have the whole machine erected in time to make tests on the river before the ice breaks up this spring.

### Made a Presentation.

Friday afternoon, the members of the reportorial staff of the Whig, who waited upon F. H. Williams, who has been a valued member of the staff for some time, and presented him with a fine pipe and case, on the occasion of his leaving for Winnipeg, where he will take a position on the staff of the Telegram.
