GIFT FUNDS FOR MCGILL UNIVERSITY OF MONTREAL.

GOVERNORS ARE SAD

BECAUSE CHERISHED IDEAS MUST BE ABANDONED.

THE MANAGEMENT BELIEVES THE SCRIP WAS REGARDED AS OF GOOD VALUE, BUT AS IT HAS NOT TURNED OUT SO THE BOARD IS IN A QUANDARY AS HOW TO ACT.

MONTREAL, Feb. 19.—Governors of McGill University two months ago issued a call for subscriptions to aid in university work, and \$1,500,000 was raised. Now they are in distress, owing to the discovery that many cherished ideas for improvement will have to be abandoned because a large proportion of the subscriptions of five thousand dollars and more were made up of worthless scrip.

Much of this scrip, rejected when sent to banks for realization, is missing stock that is not listed on the Mining Exchange promotion company stock that is well-known to be valuable, today, and shares in other concerns which have not been saleable for some time.

The university management does not doubt the good faith of the men who made their subscriptions partly in scrip, but they are in a quandary, unwilling to ask the donors to make good the deficiency in cash and yet aware that if they do not the amount available for the purposes for which the subscriptions were asked will be very materially curtailed.

The governors will meet soon to decide what action is to be taken. The difference between the total amount announced as subscribed and the total realizable value of the subscriptions is sufficiently large to cause considerable misgivings.

FIVE MEN WERE HANGED.

WHITE THEIR LAWYERS WERE PLEADING THEIR CASES.

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—Five murderers were hanged in the county jail Friday, four of whom were executed while counsel were vainly trying to obtain a stay order on the ground that their clients were insane, and one after habeas corpus proceedings in the federal court had been denied.

The four were Frank Shublaski, E. Wald Shublaski, his brother, Phillip Sommerling, and Thomas Schulz, slayers of Fred W. Gurelzon, Jr., a truck farmer, who was robbed and murdered in the outskirts of the city last October. The fifth was Thomas Jennings, a negro, who was convicted on finger prints evidence of the murder of Clarence Hiller, a railway official, whose home he attempted to rob in September, 1910. Jennings was the only one of the five who required assistance to mount the scaffold.

LA PATRIE NOT SOLD.

MONTREAL, Feb. 19.—L. J. Tasse, president and director of La Patrie, denied the truth of a story published from Ottawa to the effect that Sir Rodolphe Forget had acquired the chief interest in that paper, that all the shareholders had been bought out, and that La Patrie would in future be the French official organ of the Conservative party.
