NEED MEN OF COURAGE TRAINED TO MEET ALL OPPORTUNITIES FOR DISCOURAGEMENT

Tendency Towards Discouragement on Part of Men of To-day, in Looking at Needs of World.

"Only be thou strong, and very courageous, that thou mayest observe to do according to all the law." These words, from Joshua chapter 1, 7th verse, formed the basis of a strong sermon by Rev. E. Leslie Pidgeon, of St. Andrew's church, on Sunday afternoon, in Grant Hall, on Sunday afternoon. The courage of Joshua, standing at the head of the Hebrew host, was pointed out by the speaker, who appealed for courageous men and women. Joshua faced a great difficulty, but mastered the situation with the courage he displayed. In this way, he had been able to guide the people. Joshua was possessed of ordinary ability, but this particular occasion called for great courage. He stood firm, and had the belief that God would see him through it all.

The speaker said that he had chosen this passage, calling for courage, owing to the fact that in the present day, there was a tendency towards discouragement, as men looked out on the needs of the world. Men were disposed to fear that their strength was not equal to the task before them. Cheerfulness was one of the characteristics of the Canadian people, and why should we not be cheerful and hopeful, when living in a country,

PILOTS OF A NATION SHOULD LIVE IN A WORLD OF TRUE IDEALS.

They Should Stand Aloof From Everything Small—Sermon in St. Andrew's by Rev. E. Leslie Pidgeon, of Vancouver.

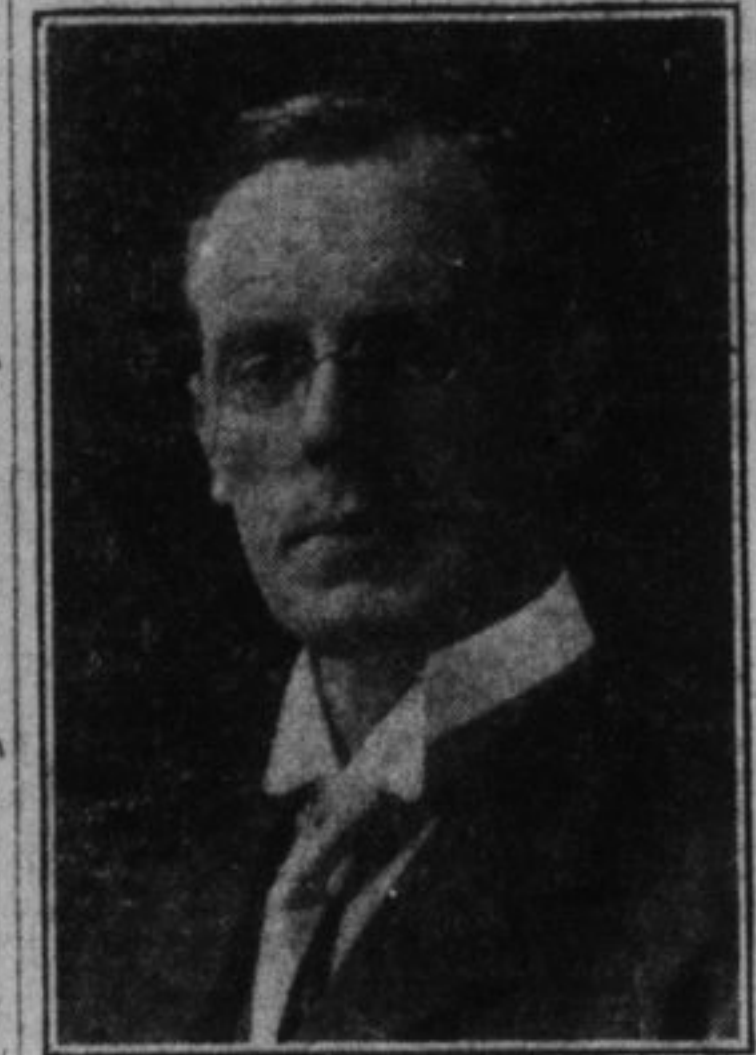
Two very forceful sermons were preached in St. Andrew's church, on Sunday, the preacher at both services being Rev. E. Leslie Pidgeon, of Vancouver, B.C.

In the morning Mr. Pidgeon based his remarks upon Ezekiel xxxvii, 5: "Thy wise men, O Tyre, that were thy pilots, shall say unto thee, 'The pilots (or pilots) of a nation must get away from the tyranny of the day, live in a world of deeper principles, to form the true ideals for the nation, these were the men fitted to lead the course of the nation. At the same time the preacher did not belittle the part of the "man in the crowd," so-called, played in the making of a nation. There must be efficiency in all classes, in the most menial kind of service, but the so-called practical man, running from point to point, is not, in the position as the prophets and thinkers are to form the national ideals, which make us common laborers in the cause of Christ and national greatness.

Explaining the text, the preacher said the Phoenicians were endowed with all that made for commercial greatness. They were especially successful in navigation, being men of daring, and making a study of the stars. The preacher likened the state to a ship, and spoke of the different classes who manned it and dealt very interestingly with the qualifications of the pilot, and the difference between him and the oarsmen and sailors. He must be in a world of deeper principles, and stand at the point of vantage apart from the rest to successfully guide the ship.

At this time Mr. Pidgeon remarked that it was obvious in recent years, in the British house of lords, and in the dominion house, that the members of these institutions who were supposed to be guiding the destiny of the empire and dominion, were not able to take an unobstructed view of the important measures, because they had private interests to serve. The pilots of a nation should stand aloof from such things. The pilot should have perfect faith in the ship and have an unflinching devotion to a cause.

The speaker continued to speak of the conditions for a pilot's work. He must have a good character, and to inspire any man to be a leader he must have a worthy task. Mr. Pidgeon drew a very vivid picture of the task before the Canadian pilot, and dwelt on what was necessary to build up the social, intellectual and religious life of Canadians. At some length he spoke of the heritage we have physically, and emphasized the necessity of having a certain amount of isolation in a nation to develop something distinctively its own.

TEMPERANCE MEN IN POLITICS.
