PURIFYING THE WATER

ADDRESS BY THE PROVINCIAL HEALTH OFFICER.

Dr. J. W. S. McCulloch, of Toronto, Says That Municipalities Should Cease Dumping Sewage Into Streams.

Dr. J. W. S. McCulloch, chief health officer of Ontario, delivered a very instructive address in old Convocation hall, Queen's University, on Tuesday afternoon. The subject was "Water Filtration and Sewage Disposal." Representatives of the city council, among whom was Mayor Hoag, were present.

Dr. McCulloch opened his remarks with a tribute to the medical profession and an outline of the task which confronted it with regard to water supply. He showed that the ratio of typhoid per hundred thousand people was much greater in Canada and the United States, where there is a surface water supply, than in the old countries. This he said was due to the contamination of our lakes and streams with sewage.

There are three ways of purifying the supply: Storage, filtration and disinfection. The storage process is that which goes on in our great lakes, allowing the water to stand until the sediment settles. The city of New York is building an immense reservoir in the Catskill mountains for this purpose at an expense of \$162,000,000.

Dr. McCulloch suggested as the best method of filtration, the slow sand filter as used by the cities of Toronto, Montreal, Washington and Philadelphia.

As to disinfection he mentioned ozone, which the city of Lindsay had found to be a failure, and that of mixing chlorine with the water which was the simplest and apparently the best disinfectant.

Canada, on account of many streams and lakes, may stand best among the countries with regard to water supply if we cease the barbarous custom of dumping the sewage into the sources of supply, namely, the rivers and lakes.

The sewage disposal was still to some extent an unsolved problem, but the speaker described the method adopted by Chicago and the Murray tank at Calgary which were to a great extent a solution of the difficulty.

Dr. McCulloch's address was followed by expressions of appreciation from Chairman Archibald Strachan, of the board of health, Dean J. C. Connell and Mayor Hoag, who suggested that a copy of the address be placed in the hands of our local health officer, Dr. Williamson.

WELCOME MILD SPELL

Railroaders Say Cold Weather Was Worst for Years.

Citizens are pleased at the mild spell after continuous cold weather, but there is no doubt the railroaders appreciate warmer weather more than any person, for they certainly have their share of discomfort.

While there were no serious blockades in this district, the trainmen say that the cold weather was the worst experienced in many years. Trains are now beginning to run more on schedule time and passengers are not given such long waits.

Old residents have been taxing their memory, to recall cold snaps, and they declare that for continued severe weather Kingston has not had the like in many years.

As George Brewster, Banff, a member of the firm of Brewster and Moore, in speaking of Jasper Park, that is being opened up by the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific through the Canadian Rockies, stated that it will excel any of the Canadian parks as a place of enjoyment. Mr. Brewster has been through the district and says it is exceptionally well stocked with wild game of all kinds; also that it is a splendid country for mountain sheep, as well as moose, deer and mountain goats. The mountains in Jasper Park are higher than in any other Canadian territory, and as soon as the Grand Trunk erect the hotels that they propose, and the government get proper trails throughout the territory it will become more popular than any of the mountain resorts on the continent.

QUEEN'S REGISTRATION.

More Students in Classes, But Less Registered.

The number of students registered at Queen's university this session is around the 1,500 mark, and is somewhat less than the registration of last session. Registrar G. Y. Chown accounts for the difference by the fact that last year was the last in which extra-mural students could secure degrees by spending less than two years in actual attendance. This session there are only 360 extra-mural students registered against 400 a year ago. There is an increase, however, in the number of students in actual attendance at the university, and that is a good feature. Never before were there so many students in the classrooms.

KEEP CHRISTIAN ATMOSPHERE.

Charter of Queen's University Will Provide for Non-Christians.

The Toronto Telegram says it is learned that as a result of the visit of Rabbi Jacobs, of Toronto, and other Jewish gentlemen from both Toronto and Montreal, to Ottawa, in regard to the constitution of Queen's University that some modification of the terms of the bill will be made by parliament. The original intention of the bill would have excluded non-Christians from the staff of the university. Rabbi Jacobs was not prepared to make any definite statement in the matter, but it is understood that a compromise was effected whereby non-Christians will be allowed to hold positions at the university provided a Christian atmosphere is maintained.

Algiers Not City for Women to Expire Alone.

No foreigner knows what the Arab does: to few has it been given to understand what he thinks; within his home he is as much master in Algeria as he is in Mecca, so long as he avoids the appearance of what the infidel calls evil, and so long as he complies with certain demands, equally foolish and outrageous to him, in respect of registration, vaccination, sanitation, and the like. There is no sharp boundary between the two countries, if you follow a street far enough you pass the imperceptible frontier. "After so many years," says M. Fromentin, "there are no barriers between the two cities except those of suspicion and antipathy existing between the two races, but those barriers were never prepared to ransack every house, to its most private apartments, in a whole district, and to do that would be, if not to provoke a revolt, at least to stir up such dangerous unrest and hostility as to make it impossible. What might happen to that stranger is best not considered. If his or her captors choose, there would be no more trace than marks the spot where a stone has fallen into the sea.
