

NEW SAND HILL CHURCH

PRESBYTERIANS HAVE FINE PLACE OF WORSHIP.

First Church Erected in 1862—A Description of the New Edifice—The Opening Services.

The 26th day of October, 1862, was the date of the opening of the first Sand Hill church, and for forty-eight years minus nine days did the Presbyterians of North Pittsburgh use this frame edifice as a house of worship.

On October 20th, a joint meeting of the elders, managers and trustees, in the home of John M. Kennedy, decided to call a special meeting of the congregation to arrange for the rebuilding of a house of worship.

The work of rebuilding was inaugurated by a meeting of the congregation at the church site on April 13th, 1911, at which the first soil for the excavation was turned up.

The formal opening of the church took place on Sabbath, February 11th. The morning services were in charge of the pastor, Rev. Messrs. R. Drinnan, of Sunbury, and J. H. McConnell, of the Pittsburgh circuit.

Prof. Laird had charge of the evening service. The Presbyterians of the Sunbury charge and the Methodists of the Pittsburgh circuit had withdrawn their services for the day.

The service of song, morning and evening, was in charge of a choir of twenty-five members, under the leadership of Mrs. H. W. Reede.

Minister Denies in Parliament That New Government is Opposed to Immigration From There.
