ON THE HIGHWAY BILL BEFORE THE COMMONS.

Bill Sustained by Only Four—The House Rejected Proposal to Further Help the West Over the Blockade.

Ottawa, Feb. 29.—By a vote of fifty-two to forty-eight, a government majority of but four on a straight party division, the terms of the ministerial measure governing the distribution of funds for the projected bill for improvement to highways were finally approved by the commons in committee of the whole yesterday afternoon.

The division took place on the motion of Mr. Macdonald (Pictou) to strike out clause six of the bill, which provided that the minister of railways, with the approval of the governor in council, may undertake the construction of any new highway or the improvement of any existing highway in any province.

By a vote of 84 to 54, a government majority of 30, the house last night rejected Hon. Mr. Oliver's amendment urging the government to secure further consideration of a reduction of railway freight rates to meet the grain blockade in the west.

Col. Sam. Hughes' blistering policy got a call-down in the house of commons in the afternoon, when W. E. Knowles, of Moose Jaw, read a letter which the minister of militia had written to the city council of Moose Jaw in regard to the selection of a site for a drill hall.

Mr. Knowles asserted that the letter was entirely unworthy of a minister of the crown, for which he called for an order by the speaker, whereupon he retorted, amid liberal cheers, and the letter was "quite worthy of the minister," and this explanation was accepted.

GEORGIAN CANAL COMPANY

Seems Assured of Renewal of Its Charter. One is that the company shall not take any provincial lands without the consent of the provincial governments, and the other amendment that all rates for power shall be subject to the jurisdiction of the railway commission. The company thus seems assured of the renewal of its charter.
