### ROBBED DRUNKEN MAN

SCHOOL BOY CONFESSED TO BOLD THEFT TO POLICE.

Put Hand in Man's Pocket While he was on Princess Street and Made Off With \$20 — Divided the Amount With His Chum—Nearly All the Amount Has Been Recovered.

The fact that two of the teachers in one of the public schools noticed that two of the boys in her class were flourishing quite a sum of money, led to the recovery of stolen money amounting to \$16. The total amount stolen was \$20, but a full settlement is to be made. Constable Arniel made an investigation, after being notified by the teachers, with the result that he found that a twelve-year-old lad had taken the money from a young farmer, on Princess street, while he was under the influence of liquor. The lad had a chum with him at the time and they divided the spoils. The boys were selling newspapers on the street. The theft occurred a few days ago.

A strange part of the affair is that the young fellow who lost the money did not know that he had been robbed until the case was investigated by Constable Arniel, and one of the lads confessed. The young fellow sold his farm recently, and on the day in question put about \$3,500 in a local bank, and kept about \$500 for his own use. Unfortunately for him, he indulged rather too freely, evidently celebrating the sale, and the fact that he was leaving for the west, and when the lad slipped his hand into his pocket he was "dead to the world," as the saying goes. However, he remembered seeing the boys around him, and when taken to the school identified the boys who had flourished the money. When the lads were first asked as to where they had secured the money, they stated that a drunken man, in a local hotel, had thrown it on the floor. Afterwards they stated the man had given it to them. The man denied having given them any money, and later one of the youngsters confessed to the theft. The boys went to their home and procured \$16 of the stolen money, and their parents have promised to make good the rest of the amount. The man who lost the money does not care to prosecute, and, as the money has been returned, the police will not take action.

#### RAISE IN DOCTORS' FEES

Will be Made in Kingston—Schedule Being Fixed.

At a meeting of the Kingston Medical Society, on Friday evening, the question of increasing the fees of the doctors was discussed, and it was decided that a schedule should be prepared for submission at the next meeting, a month hence. It is likely that the fee will be increased from twenty-five to fifty per cent. Hitherto there has been no schedule of medical fees in Kingston, but the doctors will abide by the one to be arranged.

### TEACHERS ARE SCARCE

BUT MINISTER OF EDUCATION IS NOT WORRIED.

Third-class Certificate to be Further Restricted—What Hon. Dr. Pyne Told the Legislature.

Toronto, March 2.—The report of the minister of education for 1911, which was laid on the table of the legislature, yesterday, in no respect cast the success of educational work of the province he more accurately gauged than in the qualifications of the teachers employed. Notwithstanding the debates in the legislature, the minister of education, seems to take an optimistic view of the situation. He states that in no respect can the success of educational work of the province be more accurately gauged than in the qualifications of the teachers employed.

"It is gratifying to find that the normal trained teachers are steadily replacing those with third-class certificates. This process is gradual, but steady, and affords proof that the seven normal schools are effecting the results expected of them. In due course, limited third-class certificates will, as intended, be restricted to those districts in the new parts of the province or in outlying or wealthy sections of counties which are unable to secure more highly trained teachers," Dr. Pyne said.

### OTTAWA QUEEN'S MEN

HELD THEIR ANNUAL DINNER FRIDAY EVENING.

Dean Cappon Delivered an Admirable Address on Canada's Literature—The Various Toasts Honored.

Ottawa, March 2.—Many Kingstonsians and many former Kingstonsians last night attended the annual banquet of the Queen's University Society of Ottawa. The attendance was larger than ever before.

This has been an annual event for the past eight years, and on each occasion the society has met with marked success. A number of Ottawa's most prominent men were present. Judge MacTavish presided.

Probably the most important address of the evening was delivered by Dean Cappon, professor of English in Queen's. The professor devoted his time to a brief survey of Canadian literature, and divided it into three classes, the literature of art, the literature of the interpretation of life, and the literature of service, and he dwelt on the character of each one. He said that Canada was too young and vigorous a nation to develop a literature of the first type. In the second type he included the works of the literature of the past, and paid a tribute to the rough vigor which characterizes it.

The toast to "The Parliament of Canada" was proposed by George F. Henderson, who paid a tribute to the present parliament and its members and signified its importance. Dr. M. Clarke, M.P., and Dr. M. Steel, M.P., replied to the toast.

R. W. Brock drew the attention of his listeners to the growing greatness of Queen's University, and stated that he strongly believed that the institution was doing a great deal towards building up the great national character of Canada. This toast was replied to by Dean Cappon and Prof. Gwillim.

Ald. F. E. Perry, delivered an excellent address in proposing the toast to the sister institutions, and he was followed by a number of prominent gentlemen representing several of the leading institutions.

#### MISSIONARY SERVICES

To be Held in All the Anglican Churches.

Rev. Canon Gould, general secretary of the M.S.C.C., and R. W. Allin, M.A., assistant general secretary, will conduct a course of study in missionary work and problems at St. George's cathedral and other Anglican churches, commencing on Sunday next. Rev. A. J. Vale and D. M. Rose, secretary of the Anglican branch of the L.M.M., will also assist. There will be special sermons in all the churches on Sunday, and a mass meeting of Sunday schools at St. James' church at 3.15 o'clock on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. Holy communion will be celebrated at the cathedral at 10.15 and at 12 noon there will be a service, strictly limited to twenty minutes, to give those who are busy all day a chance of attending during part of the lunch hour. There will be a study class at St. George's hall every afternoon from 3.15 to 4.15 on "The Reproach of Islam," and from 4.30 to 5.15 lantern talks for children and young people.

In the evenings there will be a study class on Dr. Tucker's book "From Sea to Sea," from 7.45 to 8.15, followed by an address and missionary service. On Wednesday there will be a special conference for men after the usual evening service at eight o'clock.

All interested in mission work are most cordially invited to attend at all or any of the above services, and particular attention is called to the noon service, which will consist of a hymn, prayers, and a brief address, and to the lantern talks for children every afternoon.

Special missionary addresses will be delivered on Sunday as follows: St. George's cathedral, morning, Rev. Canon Gould; St. James church, evening, Rev. A. J. Vale; St. Paul's church, morning, D. M. Rose; evening, Rev. Canon Gould; St. Luke's church, morning, R. W. Allin; evening, D. M. Rose; St. John's, Portsmouth, morning, Rev. A. J. Vale; evening, R. W. Allin.
