

The late Rev. John Machar, D.D., became the minister of St. Andrew's in 1827, and presided over it for thirty-six years. He died on the 7th of February, 1863. He was the esteemed father of Miss Agnes M. Machar, the eminent authoress. Dr. Machar was succeeded by Rev. W. Maxwell Inglis, in 1863. He retired from St. Andrew's and the ministry in 1871, and devoted himself to the medical profession in New York. Rev. Dr. Smith became minister in 1874. 


