TWENTY-TWO TEACHERS IN SPORTING CIRCLES JUST TWO DAYS MORE

IN ONTARIO SCHOOLS CANNOT SPEAK ENGLISH.

Report of Dr. Merchant on the Bilingual Schools — English-French Schools Lack in Efficiency.

Toronto, March 7.—Dr. F. W. Merchant's long-looked-for report on bilingual schools was presented to the legislature just before adjournment yesterday afternoon, by Hon. W. J. Hanna. The report is a lengthy document covering some eighty-one pages of a pamphlet. It goes over the whole course of instruction and study in the English-French schools, as they are styled, and gives an abundance of tabulated material. Dr. Merchant has adhered strictly to the terms of his commission. He has investigated and reported, but there is little recommendation.

If a summary of the report could be given it would be that the "English-French schools are, on the whole, lacking in efficiency," and a large proportion of the children in the schools concerned have to meet the "demands of life with an inadequate equipment in education." Many of the teachers have not a sufficient command of English to speak the language with any degree of freedom. Along with other schools Dr. Merchant notes a tendency to promote children too rapidly. In many schools English was regarded simply as one subject among many others. The bilingual situation presented a problem of special difficulty, the report says, and the inspectors had too many schools to look after. There was also the difficulty of obtaining an adequate supply of teachers, but given a competent force of well-trained teachers, the schools might, in time, "be made quite as efficient as the schools in English-speaking localities."

HER LEFT FOOT WAS CUT OFF BY A TRAIN

Mrs. Bullock, wife of William Bullock, a lady about thirty-seven years of age, had her left foot cut off by a freight car at the lower G.T.R. junction about 2.30 o'clock Thursday afternoon. Mrs. Bullock lives near the junction and was crossing the tracks, taking a short cut home. She saw a freight train standing still, and thinking that no engine was attached, started to crawl under one of the cars. Just as she did this the train, which was standing, moved, with the above result.

Dr. A. W. Richardson was quickly summoned, and dressed the crushed member at the station, after which the unfortunate woman was taken to the general hospital in Corbett's ambulance. She remained conscious throughout.

CHURCH UNION RESULTS.

Many Large Ontario Congregations in Favor of Movement.

Toronto, March 7.—The results of the voting on church union from a number of the large Presbyterian congregations of Ontario were received yesterday, and all show a majority for the movement, as follows:—Knox church, Walkerton, session, for 8, against 3; members, for 27, against 22; adherents for 25, against 8; Knox church, Paisley, session, for 77, against 2; members, for 96, against 33; adherents, for 10, against 2; Egmondville Presbyterian church, members, for 205, against 19; adherents, for 34, against 5; St. Andrew's church, Amherstburg, voted 2 to 1 in favor of union; Galt Presbyterian church, session, for 10, against 3; members, for 131, against 15; Guthrie Presbyterian church, session, for 4, against 4; members, for 122, against 41; adherents, for 8, against 4; for basis, session, for 3, against 3; members, for 80, against 54; adherents, for 4, against 5.

The members of the Wesley Methodist church, Amherstburg, voted 192 to 1 in favor of union; quarterly official board of the Ainsworth street Methodist church, Galt, voted for 32, against 2. The Methodist vote at Varna, Ont., was as follows: quarterly official board, for 28, against 3; members, for 500, against 12; adherents, for 52, against 3.

SYRACUSE OPINION OF KINGSTON FRONTENACS.

An All-Star Team Will Meet James T. Sutherland's Seven—Tie in the Hartly Hockey Trophy Competition.

Syracuse will be introduced to-night to the real Canadian brand of hockey, the fast, clever, combination game which has made hockey the king of all winter sports across the border. During the past three months the local fans have seen the intercollegiate brand of hockey—at times fast and again slow and rather dragging. The hockey season is now drawing near a close, and the management of the Arena recently determined that the local fans should have a chance to witness over the Canadian brand of hockey, and to-night's game between the Frontenacs, of Kingston, Ont., and the new Arena team will be the opener of the new programme.
