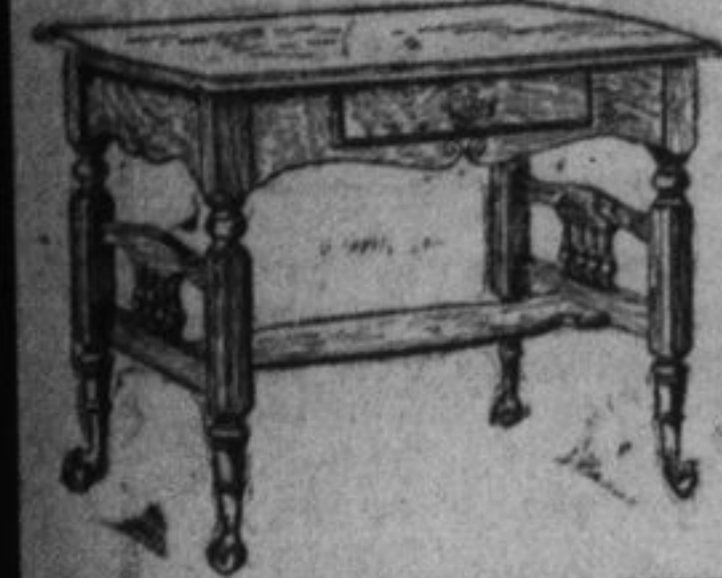

IN PLACE OF SALOONS DORMITORY CONTRACT INNOCENT SUFFERING

IT WILL BE NECESSARY TO AWARDED TO MICHAEL SULLIVAN, OF THIS CITY.

Whose Tender Was the Lowest - The Military College at Last to Have More Room for Cadets' Quarters. The contract for erecting a new dormitory at the Royal Military College has been awarded to Michael Sullivan, of this city, whose tender was the lowest. Mr. Sullivan is the liberal contractor who for the past fifteen years has done big jobs for the Dominion government in the way of erecting armories and the mint at Ottawa. There is nothing but good feeling among the conservative contractors here, who tendored on the job at being outdone. However, Mr. Sullivan has probably no peer in Canada in the way of handling building construction work. The new dormitory building will be erected just inside the inner college gate, on the right hand side of the road, facing the campus. It will be four stories in height, and will accommodate about seventy-five cadets. There will be running water in each room. This new dormitory has been a long-felt need, and was decided upon over a year ago by the Laurier government. The contract has just now been awarded. It has been impossible to take in a larger number of cadets than 115 at the college, when there could be in attendance of 200 over there sufficient accommodation. The new dormitory will enable the college to take care of about 175 cadets.

THEME OF DEAN RIDWELL'S SERMON TO STUDENTS.

The Great Need in the Country Today is Faith in All the Best that Makes Life Good.

The Problem of Innocent Suffering was the theme of the sermon to students by the Dean of Ontario in St. George's cathedral, on the third Sunday in Lent. His text was the cry of the father stricken into desolation by the affliction of his son, "Lord, I believe; help Thou mine unbelief." The dean drew a vivid picture of the gradual sifting of hope and faith as the father tried one and then another cure and found each fail. His appeal to Jesus Christ was in the nature of a challenge. But the Lord, knowing the anguish of the tortured heart, forbore to utter what would have seemed to the man platitude—the oft-told tale of God's love even though He permitted suffering—He turned on the man with astonishing statement, "all things are possible to him that believeth." The stimulating words broke the crust, the father, without waiting for the healing of his son, cried out with tears, "Lord, I believe." The dean pointed out that the great need of the country, of its men and women to-day, is faith, faith in all the best that makes life good, faith in the Giver.

QUEEN'S ATHLETIC SURPLUS OF \$1,080 IN SEASON.

Results of the Curling Club Bonspiel—Eatons Lost to Winnipeg Victorians by 8 to 4. Queen's athletic committee held its annual meeting on Saturday evening, and the election of officers resulted: Staff, Prof. John Matheson, Prof. G. W. Mitchell, the former for one year and the latter for two years; city, J. M. Farrell for two years and J. M. Asselstine for one year; students (arts), F. D. MacKenzie, J. Lowrie, George Clarke; (science), J. H. Moxley, D. M. Jemmett, M.A.; (medicine), V. Blakales, J. N. Fraser; (theology), A. J. Wilson; (education), to be elected next fall; ladies, Miss Gertrude McCusig and Edith Shown; secretary-treasurer, J. H. Dawson. The athletic committee had a very successful year, when one considers that Queen's has won only one championship. It is able to close the year with a surplus of \$1,080 to its credit.

MEDICINE VS. SCIENCE.

The leap-year hockey game to be played at the covered rink this evening between medicine and science is causing quite a stir among the students. These two teams have met several times before and every game they have played has resulted in a tie.
