REPUBLICAN EMBLEM

NO LONGER DISPLAYED ON HOUSES IN PEKIN.

There is No Manchu Leader, Otherwise He Might Take Over the City and Proclaim a Monarch.

Pekin, March 9.—The possibility is widely discussed of the Manchus taking over the city and proclaiming a monarchy again. The Chinese papers print this suggestion, but, as no Manchu leader has been forthcoming the past six months, it seems hardly probable that one can be found now. Should a dictator arise he would find the nucleus of an army in the 20,000 or 30,000 Manchu troops, who are now the most concrete force remaining in the northern provinces. In Shen-Si, Gen. Sheng-Yun, governor of the province, whose family was slaughtered earlier in the rebellion, is still fighting in the emperor's name. It is reported that Gen. Sheng-Yun has 20,000 followers. He controls the situation in a large part of Shen-Si and Shan-Si.

The killing of many whose queues had been cut, or the attack on the Nanking delegates at the first outbreak, and the desertion of Yuan Shi Kai by his soldiers, all indicate the reactionary feeling. Furthermore, the republican flags which for a time decorated every house in Pekin, by order of the police, are now displayed only on the government buildings, although the dragon flag has not reappeared.

They Came Back Again.
Two men struck the city, in hard luck Thursday, and when night overtook them, they had no money to pay for lodging at any of the hotels, so went to the police station, and were given the best the house provides. Friday night the same two again walked in, and were given protection. They said they hoped to have work on Saturday, and would be able to pick out another boarding house.

Clown Becomes Preacher.
Peru, Ind., March 8.—After making thousands of persons laugh during the ten years he has been a clown with one of the big circuses, Raleigh L. Wilson, of Lincoln, Neb., has resigned, and hereafter will devote his time to the saving of souls. In his letter of resignation, Wilson says that, while he has no doubt of his ability to qualify as a minister, he wishes to reserve the right to rejoin the circus if he ever felt inclined to enter the sawdust ring.

Chinese Y.M.C.A. for Calgary.
Calgary, Alta., March 9.—Chinese mission of local Chinatown decided last night to establish a Chinese Young Men's Christian Association. This will be the first association of its kind in Canada.

Newfoundland Census.
St. John's, Nfld., March 9.—Newfoundland's population is 242,000, according to the complete census returns of 1911, which were made public to-day. This shows an increase of ten per cent. for the past decade.

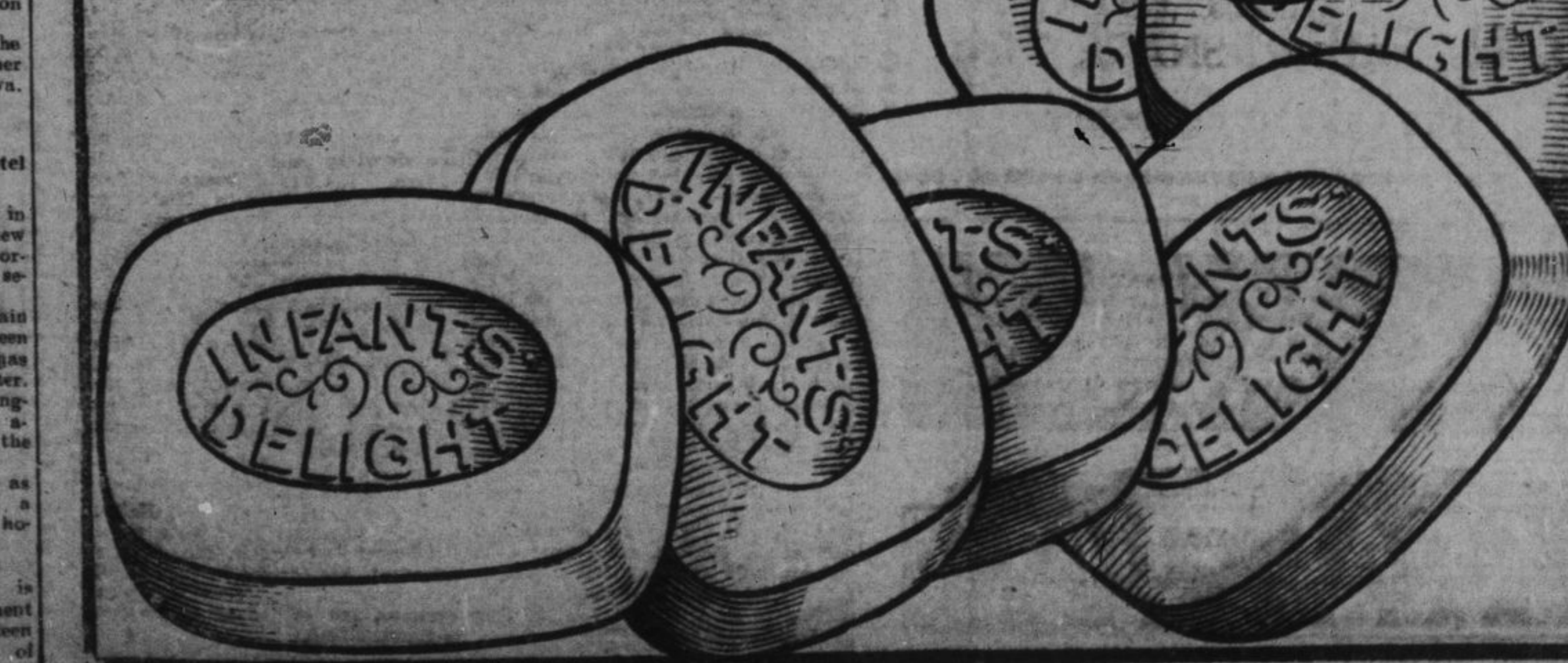
