TOLLS ON THE MARKET

BOARD OF TRADE WOULD LIKE THEM REMOVED.

Will Ask Council to Take up Matter—Effort to Increase Trade into Kingston—City in Need of Industrial Commissioner.

At a meeting of the board of trade held on Tuesday night, a resolution was passed, requesting the city council to take into consideration the question of removing the market tolls.

The board also discussed, at some length, the trade question, so far as Kingston is concerned. It was pointed out, that there was a good deal of trade, which formerly came Kingston's way, which had been diverted to other places, and the members felt that this was a question worth giving every consideration possible. As a result a special committee was appointed, to consider the question of local trade conditions. The committee was composed of C. A. Macpherson (chairman), N. C. Polson, jr., H. E. Richardson, and E. T. Steacy.

The president, Dr. E. Ryan, presided at the meeting, and the other members present were Joseph Abramson, F. R. Anglin, George Bawden, A. H. Blackley, Rev. J. D. Boyd, R. Easton Burns, W. H. There was a good deal of discussion on a communication which complained about the manner in which the Bell Telephone company is tearing up the porpoises around the city, for the purpose of putting in the "anchors" for the telephone poles. It was felt that this work was marring the appearance of the city, and, as a result of the discussion, which followed, a resolution was passed, setting forth the willingness of the board, to assist the city council, in any proceedings necessary to be taken, to have the company place their wires underground.

A request was received from interested parties, that the board assist in an endeavor which is being made to have the post office department deliver letters to the city limits. The board decided to approach the Kingston postmaster on the matter.

Elmer Davis, chairman of the industries' committee, reported that it would be a great assistance to the board if they could have at hand data for prospective citizens and manufacturers, and the board will endeavor to secure records from the owners of property. This is not to be carried out with the intention of doing harm to the real estate business, but simply so that the board might have the information on hand, to give out, when a request is made by any person or any firm. Just recently, the board received a letter from an outside firm, looking for a building with a certain amount of floor space, and had the secretary of the board had the desired information at the time, he would have been able to have had the firm at once. The plan is regarded as a good one.

The board will simply keep a record

of the property, and then if information is desired, would give out the name of the owner of the property and the agent, in each case.

Following up the discussion on the securing of new industries, the board decided to make a request to the city council, for the appointment of an industrial commissioner, or to set aside annually a certain sum, for the securing of information concerning the city and district which will be of benefit to the newcomers in the industrial line.

The chairman of the membership committee, G. B. McKay, reported that the board had secured fifty-three new members, during the last two weeks. The total membership is now 205, consisting of 100 members, and fifteen associate members.

R. J. Carson, chairman of the wholesale committee, submitted a report in reference to the handling of freight on the Kingston & Pembroke railway. The committee recommended that some action be taken to have the railway despatch goods for points north of Sharbot Lake. At the present time it is only sent to these points three days per week, and the dealers want it for the six days. The committee was backed up in its recommendation by letters from several of the local wholesale dealers. It was decided to have the board take up the matter with the management of the railway company.

SEPARATE SCHOOL BOARD.

Alterations Will Likely be Made at St. Mary's School.

A meeting of the members of the Roman Catholic separate school board, was held in the board room Tuesday evening.

After the adoption of the minutes, reports were received from the chairman of the property committee, in regard to some work proposed to be done at St. Vincent's school. It was suggested that the committee still continue to deal with the matter, and that certain plans and specifications be prepared and information obtained by the committee, to report to the board at the next meeting.

It was also suggested, that some alterations be made in St. Mary's school. The property committee were instructed to look into the matter, and report at the next meeting.

It was decided that as St. Patrick's day fell on Sunday this year, that the usual St. Patrick's day holiday be given to the children on Monday, March 18th.

After dealing with a few minor matters, the meeting adjourned.

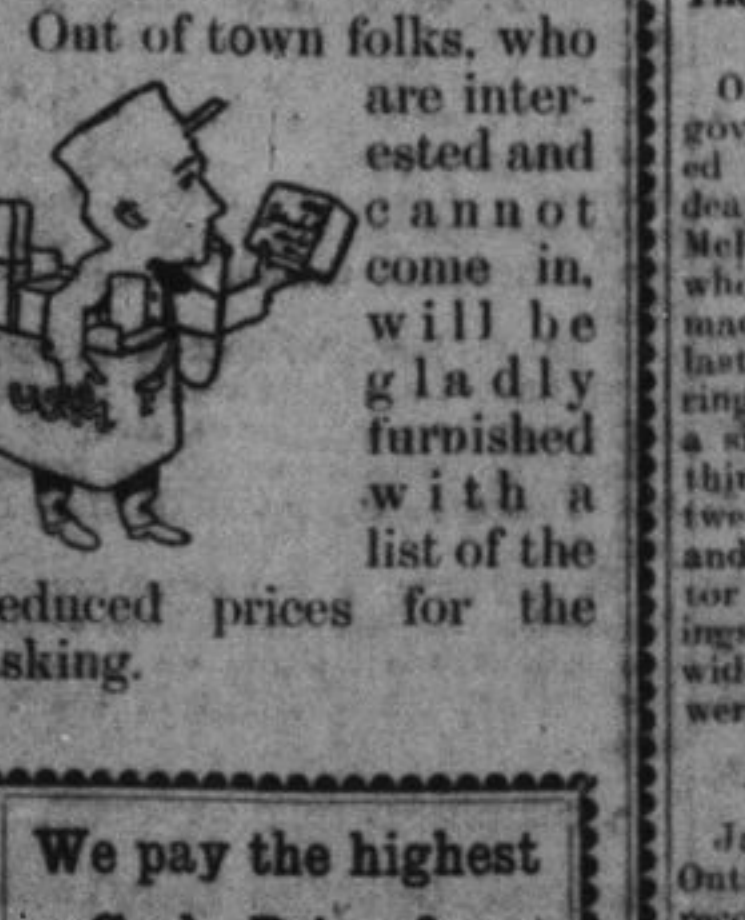
