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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

Calling For Law Enforcement.

Verona March 11.—(To the Editor) Rev. Mr. Farrell, of the Dominion Alliance, conducted a temperance meeting last evening in the Methodist church. After the address a discussion took place in which some pretty plain statements were made as to the success of local option in this village. It was brought out that it was not as successful as it should be, and this through non-enforcement of the law. It is not an infrequent occurrence to see men on the streets the worse of liquor. It cannot be denied that the law prohibiting the local sale of liquor is daily winked at, and is rapidly becoming non-effective. Indirectly, if not directly, sales are made. Men club together and one of the number takes the money, orders the liquor in quantity, and when it comes distributes it; others go to Kingston on Thursday and bring home a parcel of four or five bottles, and pass them about, or a jug is brought in and bottles are filled for those who have the proper amount of cash, and who will not talk. Even the sale in glasses in limited quantity at one time is believed to be going on. This has been carried on for a year or more, but Friday last was a record day. That such days will be frequent soon may be expected unless stern measures of suppression are taken. But by whom will such steps be taken? It need not be expected by those who have a license to sell it and reside outside of the township, in Kingston or Sharbot Lake; they will sell so long as they can get a license and a buyer; neither by those who would like to see the local option plan of prohibition discredited. These find pleasure in flinging taunts at its failure to prohibit, to the advocates of the plan, and not either by those who have no higher conception as citizens than to violate the law when to do it yields them profit. Then by whom? Only by those who suffer or those others who feel a burden of responsibility for the moral uplift of the community, and who believe this evil, in its power to degrade and destroy the individual, is one of the greatest of all evils.

Are there those who suffer? Yes, and often in silence until compelled to speak. Are there those who, while they do not suffer, still feel a responsibility for such moral uplift? Surely there must be some. Why do they not act? This evil is a force and will increase and finally conquer unless met and overcome by force. This latter force is the law put into and kept in motion, strongly supported by every one who desires to see righteousness, and not evil, prevail. No such one should shun his responsibility on to some one else. Each should be

willing to do his part. Organization of the temperance force is necessary and the formation of a strong committee which will see that the local option law is fearlessly and sternly enforced. There is profit in the sale of liquor but those who would make such profit must be made to know, by verbal warning, fine, or imprisonment, that here such effort for gain is unlawful and will not be tolerated.—LOCAL OPTION.
