A BUSINESS TRANSFER

KINGSTON PAPER BOX CO. CHANGES HANDS

The Business Acquired by the British Whig Publishing Co., Ltd.—The Plant Will be Improved and Extended—A Fine Trade Already Established.

Some few years ago the Kingston Paper Box company was formed, primarily for supplying the local trade, which in itself was of considerable revenue. The new industry was located in a fine stone building on King street west, just across the street from the Kingston Hosiery company. From its inception the new industry found no difficulty in securing all the orders it could fill. The management, however, was not quite so satisfactory. Changes in ownership resulted from time to time. In January, 1911, W. R. Hewton took charge, and succeeded in putting the business on a better basis. However, the growing volume of trade seriously taxed the capacity of the plant, and Mr. Hewton found it necessary either to increase the capital of the company in order to take care of the growing trade, or to dispose of the business.

On Monday last, the plant, goodwill, etc., were acquired by the British Whig Publishing company, limited, which will hereafter conduct the business, though the name of the Kingston Paper Box company will still be retained. Improvements and extensions will be undertaken at the earliest possible moment, so that all orders may be promptly filled and the output of the factory considerably increased. The products of the Paper Box company already command a splendid sale among the Kingston merchants, and in other parts of Ontario as well. That they appeal strongly to the trade is evidenced from large orders recently received from the North-West and from the maritime provinces.

The company manufactures paper and cardboard boxes for confectioners, tailors, milliners, drygoods houses, etc. It possesses valuable patents on an especially good folding box, which is now enjoying a wide sale. There is every reason to believe that under new and aggressive management this business will develop into goodly proportions and become a valuable addition to the city's industries.

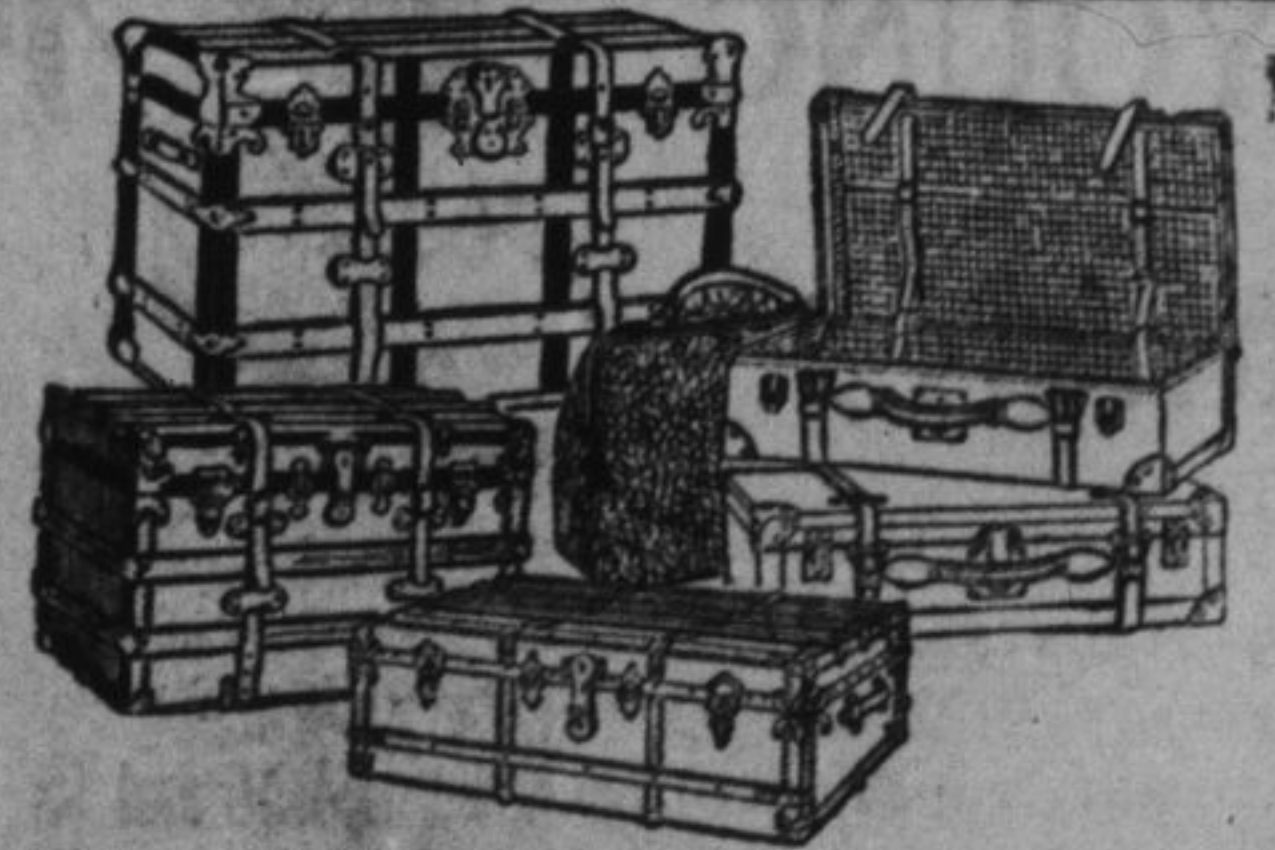
