

If Canada wants reciprocity it should be considered upon an entirely new basis. It should be for complete reciprocity, absolute free trade between the two countries and the abolition of the custom houses, or else for no reci procity at all. As has been proved by events; the present reciprocity agree ment, which was accepted by the American congress, and is still a part of the law of the nation, gave Canada altogether the best of it. It has suffered because of its rejection of it The United States has not suffered, but has probably profited because of the Canadian rejection. Certainly Mr. Taft's administration or no other administration would dare offer those same terms again, but as the matter stands Canada would not need to ask terms, but simply to ratify the treaty which is already in existence and has the official sanction of the United States.
