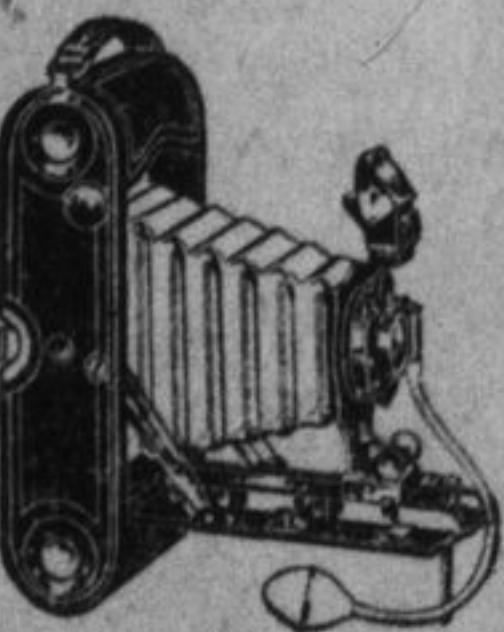

## JEWELS WILL ENDEAVOR

TO UPSET THE QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY BILL.

Montreal Lawyer Has Been Retained—He Says Queen's is Intolerant and Narrow-minded.

Montreal, March 15.—The Jews of this city have retained one of the best Montreal lawyers, S. W. Jacobs, K.C., to look into the law to see whether Queen's university bill cannot be upset on account of the clause in it which places Jews under a disability.

Mr. Jacobs has given the newspapers a red-hot interview on the subject. He has said: "Within the last few days we have seen the province of Quebec worked up over the Kewatin bill because 196 Roman Catholics will be deprived of certain rights claimed to have been granted to Roman Catholics by the act of 1875. Yet here we have an instance of a much more important character, where 100,000 Jewish citizens are publicly insulted, and no persons seem to pay any attention to it, outside of those directly affected. The absurdity of the bill may be seen by placing together clause 3 and clause 20. Clause 3 reads:

"The management and discipline of the university shall be in every respect free from all denominational restrictions," and clause 20 says that "the university shall continue distinctively Christianian."

"It has been said the institution might fall into the hands of Jews. In answer to this objection, I would like the gentleman who made use of this statement to know that when the time comes that Jews will be able to control the universities of this country, their ambition might soar a little higher than to wish to corral an institution which is showing such a narrow-minded and intolerant spirit as Queen's College.

"I notice, however, that no religious tests are to be applied to benefactors though it might be possible that a test is to be applied to benefactors using the money of Jews as unacceptable."

Grossmith's Turn. A capital story about the late Sir Henry Irving is told in some reminiscences by George Grossmith.

He was staying at the same hotel as Sir Henry Irving. His fly was waiting for him, and as the hall porter opened the door, Mr. Grossmith noticed an enormous crowd outside.

"Are these people waiting to see me leave the hotel?" he asked.

"No, sir; they are waiting to see Sir Henry Irving," replied the porter.

"But doesn't Sir Henry find this a bit of a nuisance?"

"The porter replied: 'It does worry him a bit, sir; he doesn't like it.'"

"Well, I'll do him a good turn," said Mr. Grossmith.

Pulling up the collar of his fur-lined coat, adjusting his pince-nez, and pulling his Hornberg hat over his brow, Mr. Grossmith strode down the steps with Irving's gait.

The cheering was great and some of the people even followed the carriage.

When Sir Henry came down a little later he found no crowd awaiting him. Subsequently he mentioned the matter to Mr. Grossmith, remarking, with humorous twinkle in his eye:

"You ought not to have done that. I pay these people to come every night."

Rat Kings. Animals born with tails general develop considerable use for them, but a misfortune may happen to them that will cause them to wish they had no tails.

A curious instance of this is what has been called a "rat king," in which, by an accident just after birth, the members of a litter of rats become connected by their tails so that it is impossible for them to extricate themselves.

This singular condition is said to be brought about by the tails becoming so entwined that, should a little clay adhere to them, they cannot be separated.

When this condition is perceived by the older rats the young are not left to perish, but are accorded the greatest care.

A "rat king" discovered and killed in Germany contained seven members in perfect condition, physically, except for the entanglement of the tails. These had grown in such a way as to completely entwine one another, but the rats were in the very best health, conclusive proof that astonishing good care had been bestowed upon them by their more fortunate rat brethren.
