

DEATHS AT LONG POINT.

Mrs. Ira Bevins Passed Away Very Suddenly.

Long Point, March 12.—The people of this neighborhood were shocked to hear of the sudden death of Mrs. Ira Bevins on Sunday, March 3rd. Although a woman of seventy-four years she was remarkably smart and had done all of her morning's work, and about nine o'clock was taken with some pains in the stomach and a doctor was called, but to no avail. She died before twelve o'clock. She, with her husband, who have been married about fifty-three years, lived the most of their married life here and were very much esteemed and respected. She leaves an aged husband and seven children, three sons and four daughters, all married, with the exception of one son, Joseph, who lived at home. She also leaves several grandchildren and great-grandchildren. The funeral took place at the Olive church, the services being conducted by Rev. Mr. Curtis, Seely's Bay, after which the remains were placed in the vault at Seely's Bay.

Another aged resident died quite suddenly early on Saturday morning, in the person of Edward Bryan, 75 years of age, for a few hours, although he had been in failing health for some time. He was seventy-five years of age and had always been a resident here, and was never married. He leaves an aged sister, who kept house for him, and two nephews, Jacob and Thomas Bryan, and two nieces, Mrs. L. Murphy, of Potsdam, N.Y., and Mrs. S. N. Chipman, of Ottawa. His funeral took place on Sunday afternoon, at the Anglican church, Lyndhurst, the services being performed by Rev. Mr. Smith.


