The Lampman has been asked to quote what Charles Lockens and company are doing when he visited this town in the year 1892. It is just seventy years since Dickens relieved himself of these words. The present town buildings were just then being reared.

"Well, really I have forgotten," was the reply. "And what was the subject?" "Well, to tell you the truth, I really could not tell you what it was, but it was a splendid discourse anyway."

The Lampman supposes that clergymen are protected in regard to performing marriage ceremonies by the license document presented to them. This document comes from an issue which represents the government, but who is evidently more eager to sell the wedding authority than he is to enquire into the age of the bride or the relationship of the contracting parties. When fourteen-year-olds come to Kingston and get a marriage license, there is something wrong with the system, the Lampman thinks.

Napanee, March 16.—The death occurred Wednesday last of Cecil Sproule, son of Mrs. Sam Sproule, West street, after three months' severe suffering from a tumor on the brain. He was taken ill in Winnipeg last December, and was brought to Toronto, where several operations were performed to relieve the pain in his head, but none of them proved successful. Deceased was a bright, intelligent boy, about twenty years of age. A family of several brothers and sisters, besides his mother, mourn.

LORD PIERRE TO QUIT.

To Retire From Great Shipbuilding Concern.

London, March 16.—It is reported from Belfast on good authority that Lord Pierre has intimated his intention not only of retiring from the chairmanship of Harland and Wolff, but of severing his connection with the company. In connection with this report, the Review of Reviews announces that some time ago Lord Pierre sold his major interests in the company to John Brown and company, who own the celebrated Clyde Bank Shipbuilding works, and who will enter into full control of the famous Irish shipyard when Lord Pierre retires from the chairmanship.

The London Times says it is well known that John Brown and company have been interested in Harland and Wolff for years. "A working agreement existed between the two companies," it says, "but our Belfast correspondent, who made enquiries among some of the leading engineers and the great shipbuilding firms in Belfast, was unable to get any confirmation of the statement that John Brown and company would ultimately enter into complete control."

RUN TO KINGSTON.

Arrangements Are Being Made For Service.

Ogdensburg, N.Y., March 16.—A fast steamer service between this city and Kingston will probably be established the coming season by Capt. A. R. Hinchley, of Oswego, who recently purchased the steamyacht, Say When, which can run twenty-seven miles an hour. The Say When is a roomy craft of luxurious equipment, which was built by the Herreshoff for the late Mr. Barnard, and she is reported to be the fastest of her size and type on inland waters. Capt. Hinchley has written here that he has secured satisfactory dockage facilities at Kingston and hopes that similar accommodations will be provided for him here by those interested. The matter has been turned over to the business men's association and in all probability the wants of Capt. Hinchley will be fully attended to.

Sentenced to Death.

New York, March 16.—A London cable says: Judge Bucknill, a prominent Free Mason, had the painful duty, yesterday, of sentencing to death a brother Mason, Frederick Henry Seddon, forty years old, an insurance superintendent, who, after nine days' trial in London, was found guilty of poisoning Eliza Ann Barrow, an elderly spinster, for her money. Seddon's wife was acquitted.

Asked to Die in Jail.

New York, March 16.—Charles W. Bartlett, white-haired and decrepit, an eighty-year-old forger and swindler, the oldest known to the New York police, pleaded guilty, yesterday, to attempted forgery in the second degree. He expressed the hope that he would be given a long term that he might die in prison. Justice Swann, in general sessions court, sentenced him to five years, but physicians say he cannot live that long.

SEPARATION TALK.
Feeling is Growing Throughout Canadian West.
Calgary, Alta., March 15.—Within the next two years, the question of Western Canada, drawing away from the eastern part of the dominion and becoming a separate country altogether, will become a live issue, according to Lieut.-Col. James C. Walker, who has just returned from an extended visit to the east.
"We in the Calgary district, and in fact throughout Alberta, have no idea of the talk about separation that is going on in Manitoba and parts of Saskatchewan," said Col. Walker. "On the trains and all over Manitoba farmers and business men are discussing this matter, and I have been told repeatedly that within the next twenty-four months this will become a live issue. I believe it myself, now that my eyes have been opened, and I think that before long we will find that a big movement toward this end will be publicly started."
Col. Walker states that the car shortage and unsatisfactory conditions regarding grain, are at the bottom of the movement, the people of the west being tired of seeing their grain rotting in the fields and not being moved, when there is a market to the south, which has been closed to them.
"The west wants freer trade, that is very evident, and the time is coming when the west will get it," Col. Walker said. "If they can get it by no other means it certainly looks as if separation will be the means used to attain their ends."
