WITH THE KINGSTON BOY SCOUTS

A Saturday Trip.

On Saturday, March 9th, a party of Scouts set out about 11 a.m. to explore the neighborhood of Simoon Island. After an hour's brisk walk they reached Four Mile Point and proceeded to get dinner ready. The homely slap jack, in the guise of a marmalade sandwich, formed the "piece de resistance," although kabobs (broiled beefsteak), cocoa, rusks and oatcakes vanished before the hungry Scouts' attack. This party reports the snow to be drifted very deep on the shore, yet packed hard enough to render snowshoes unnecessary. The higher parts of the shore are thickly coated with ice left by the autumn gales.

From Four Mile Point the party visited Snake Island, pausing at the lighthouse long enough to find out that its west wall is a mass of ice, several inches thick. On Snake Island a semicircular wall of snow was raised, and a splendid camp fire made from a dead elm tree. Here, in addition to the former menu, the Scouts supped off sausage meat. The bread they tried to bake was a failure, the outside being burnt and the centre very doughy.

The Scouts, on breaking up camp, reached the city about eight o'clock.

MORE MONEY FOR ROADS.

Government to Increase Grant to \$200,000 Annually.
Winnipeg, March 16.—In response to a deputation representing the Manitoba Good Roads Association and the Union of Manitoba Municipalities Premier Roblin promised to increase the government grant in aid of roads from one to two hundred thousand dollars annually.
