NATIVE PRINCES HAVE GREAT POWER IN PROVINCES.

heir Position Is More Important Than That of European Nobles for Each Is a Monarch In His Own Right-There Are No Less Than Six Hundred Ruling Houses Headed by the Great Nizam.

At this moment, when all that is endid in Anglo-Indian majesty has recently been gathered in one great Eastern dependency, and weird and nderful names, the significance of which is generally lost in this counit is appropriate that a brief space should be devoted to a succinct explanation of the position occupied by the great chiefs who assembled in the capital of Aurungzeb to do homage at the coronation of their feudal King-

So many misconceptions are entertained by the public about the potentates of India that the present is the right moment for making their posi-tion clear. Anything like a biographical description of the Indian chiefs is, of course, impossible here, but there are certain notable points in relation to the Indian royalties which may profitably be noted.

To define the individual significance of each titular style among the Rajahs of India would be a useless task, for it is almost incapable of PRICES with India. The best explanation is |given by Whitaker's Peerage, but its right to be accepted as an authority may be gauged by the statements that "Maharajah, Raja, and Nawab correspond with English

A more erroneous conception of the relative position of the Indian princes It is impossible to conceive. But it explains the difficulty of dogmatizing upon Indian royalty, even when wellknown Anglo-Indian gentlemen are asked to co-operate in arriving at conclusions. But in a simple form we will endeavor to put the status of the various high dignituries of India clearly before the reader.

The Indian "Debrett," if there were such a compilation, would contain the family details of no less than six hundred ruling houses. The chief of these is the young Nizam of Hyder-abad, whose coronation took place, with an immense display of feudal magnificence, last May. He is the actual ruler of a country bigger than Britain, with powers of life and death

over millions of subjects.

To describe the Nizam as corresponding to a British peer is as ridiculous a statement as could well be made. The Nazim's position is so curious that he might be given a separate article. Next to the ruler of Hyderabad are the Maharajahs of Baroda, Mysore, and Cashmire. These gentlemen are all kings. In a word, they correspond in India with the German kings in Europe.

Another great Indian prince is the Rao of Kutch, and as he is the Indian potentate with whom the writer is

Soldiers Were Branded.


